Especially effective were his efforts to prevent apostacy and some of his peniferits achieved martyrdom for their faith. The whole vile jail, through his work, was in time simost transformed into a monastery.

One day word was brought to him that friends were working to secure his complete release from the Moors so that he might return to Portugal. "My place is here," replied Thomas. "My life, what little remains of it, will be spent in the service of these unfortunates held by the

Moors. It is God's will."
So it happened. The years passed and the heroic Augustinian grew weaker and weaker, worn by his sufferings, tolis and austrities.
