

Parish Dramatic Club Observes Fifteenth Year of Its Existence

Our Lady of Perpetual Help Dramatic Society Holds Four-Day Celebration Including Solemn High Mass, Play, Initiation and Banquet

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Nazareth College Invites Public To Dr. Swann's Coming Lecture On "Cosmic Rays" at Columbus Cen

Representing the highest type of modern scientific research in Europe and America, and at present, president of the American Physical Society, Dr. W. F. G. Swann, also Fellow of the Royal Society will give a public lecture on "Cosmic Rays" in Columbus Civic Center Auditorium on Friday evening, December 9, at 8 o'clock under the auspices of the Science Club of Nazareth College.

This will be unique, as a lecture, those in charge say, as Dr. Swann will give a popular demonstration of the latest discoveries in ray activity, stratosphere conditions and interstellar space phenomena. The speaker is said to be a happy combination of the pioneer, the scientist and the dynamic enthusiast.

In commenting upon the coming lecture, the committee in charge stated this week that all over the world men are seeking answers to these questions: What are cosmic rays? Where do they come? Do they hold the secret of creation? Able investigators are said to disagree on this subject, and Dr. Swann's lecture will give the result of his investigations and findings. With Dr. R. A. Millikan and Dr. Arthur H. Compton he has been conducting important experiments with "rays" coming from all directions of space, powerful enough to pierce several feet of lead," which have been discovered during the last few years.
