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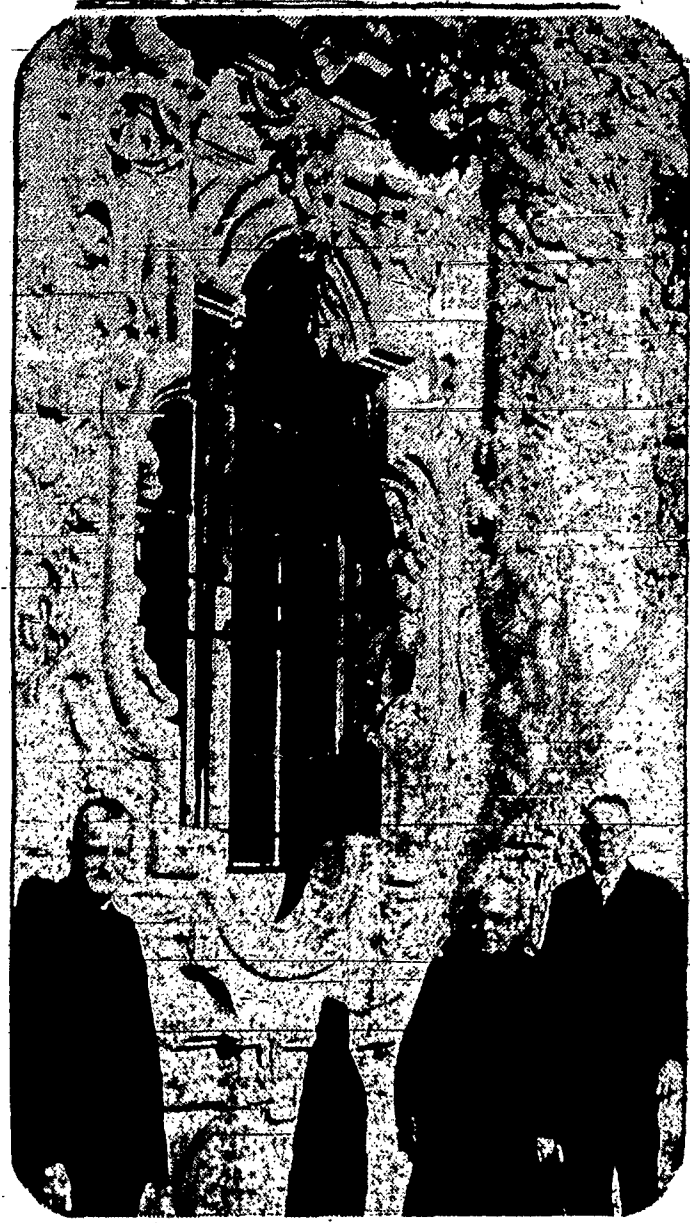
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Exiled Prelates Visit Mission

consumption will not be curtailed. Archbishop McNicholas told the delegates of the Labor federation that their work has only begun in this country. Organized labor has made much progress in the last 20 years in Europe than it did in this country, he explained.

Comments Blocking Reds In these dark days, declared Archbishop McNicholas further, "it is heartening to be assured that the insidious propaganda of Communism has made little, if any, impression upon the rank and file of American workers. That the unemployed laboring man, even when unable to procure for himself and his family the bare necessities of life, has not seen in Bolshevism or Communism a cure-all for economic evils of our day, reflects great credit upon such federations as yours. Among our intelligentsia, in our universities and so-called liberal and 'smart' publications a very effective and subtle propaganda is being carried on which, if accepted by the masses, would inevitably lead to Communism.

Concentration of wealth in the hands of a few. Control of credit by a small group. Limitless free competition "which makes might right."

"While we demand a new order in which there will be the square deal of justice, supported by honesty," said the archbishop in conclusion, "we must not forget that the present moment is one of transition—we hope to better things. A common endeavor on the part of all groups is necessary."

Girls' Reformatory Closed Meanwhile arrests continue to be made and alleged convents closed. The girls' reformatory at San Pedro de los Pinos within the Federal District, has been closed by order of the Attorney General's Office. The four nuns who assisted the directress of the institution were not imprisoned but the inmates were transferred to the Government institution, the Casa del Hogar. The directress, Sr. Correciva Asylum for Girls, Sr. Cecilia Isabel Orvananos, produced credentials showing that the inmates had been committed to the care of the institution by the Private Welfare Union, which is under the control of the Government. However, according to a story appearing in "Excelsior," the raid was made because the institution had been reported to the police as an "illegal convent."

Besides historical data and well selected verse, the book contains lists of organizations that cooperate with the hospital, statistics for the year 1932, a record of jubilee gifts, a list of grateful nurses and other interesting items.

The book in its entirety is something that will be treasured for many years by the Sisters of Charity—and all who are interested in their self-sacrificing work of mercy.

regulation with regard to the nationality requirement is in conformity with Article 9 of the Labor Law. The special requirements for teachers of geography, history and civics are intended to prevent the teaching of anything unfavorable to the program of the Revolutionary Party.

The third decree also dated November 2 makes a change in procedure. Questions arising with regard to the conditions under which teachers without diplomas who offer in lieu thereof years of practical experience and teaching will be authorized to teach in private or official schools, are to be submitted to the Major Official of the Secretariat instead of the Chief of the Department of Primary and Normal Education. The Major Official is supposed to render a decision on each case as soon as practicable.
