

Congregation and Nocturnal Adoration Society To Attend New Year's Eve Cathedral Services

New Year's Eve services in St. Patrick's Cathedral will be conducted starting at 7:45 p. m. Saturday night. The Rev. Fr. Magr. Charles F. Shay, rector, is expected to officiate at the all-night vigil before the Blessed Sacrament conducted by the Nocturnal Adoration Society will begin in the Cathedral.

The earlier services for the Cathedral congregation will consist of recitation of the Rosary, the Litany of the Holy Name, Sermon, Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament, and singing of "Holy God."

The all-night services, open to any men or women who care to attend, will begin at 10 o'clock and continue until dawn. The Rev. Fr. Shay will officiate at the different hours of the Nocturnal Adoration Society, conducting hourly services throughout the night.

Masses in the Cathedral on New Year's day will be at the usual hours 6, 7:30, 8:30, 9:30 and high Mass at 11 o'clock.

A hand-carved altar has been made by Joseph Summer, cabinet maker, and Joseph M. Wagner, carver, which has been made from a sketch of the original in a monastery in Bavaria. Villanova College fans will be elated at the news that Harry A. Stuhldreher is to continue as head football coach. Rumors afloat had the famous Notre Dame quarterback for the "Four Horsemen" days going to Fordham to succeed Major Frank Kavanagh, but Rev. John H. Crawford, Director of Athletics at Villanova, announced last week that Stuhldreher had been re-engaged.

Stuhldreher's status will be that of Professor of Physical Education and well as grid mentor. Harry will be charged with the responsibility of building a pretentious intramural program for students who are not members of a Varsity team. One of Harry's first acts was to organize a Basketball program which will include 150 students as actual participants.

Harry Stuhldreher, considered the greatest quarterback ever developed by Knute Rockne, was the "brains" of "Rock's" celebrated eleven which "Crantank" Rice termed the "Four Horsemen." The eleven themselves were responsible for the character, "The Seven Mules." "Remember that team, do you? Who can forget it? Stuhldreher, after graduation, went to Villanova to lift that college out of the doldrums of hit and miss football. His first squad was composed of men who, the previous year had made history by their failure to score even a single point, much less win a game. Since Stuhldreher took command Villanova has become one of the greatest machines in eastern circles.

Rochester fans will be more than interested in the work of Walter "Rabbit" Maraville, this city's own star who for more than 20 years has been one of the greatest of major league baseball's greatest infielders. The fielding averages, released last week by National League officials, show that Sir Walter, who is but a month 40 years of age, led all second-basemen in the senior major circuit. Walter's average for the season is .975.

Maraville partook of 149 games, six less than the full schedule played by the Boston Braves. Relegated to the bone yard by numerous sports writers last winter, the doughty Walter showed himself to be the peer of keystone sackers in the National loop. Such "youngsters" as Hughie Critz, Frankie Frisch, George Grantham, Tony Cuccinello, Bernie Fiberg, Tony Plet, et al., all were forced to take the dust from Walter's heels in the race for fielding honors. And they say the famed "Rabbit" is all washed up!

Rabbit got himself in the way of 897 batters last season. He had 402 putouts, 473 assists, and made but 22 errors. He took part in 91 double plays. When better second basemen than Walter step into the National League the band will perhaps be headed by a little fellow by the name of Maraville.

"I'm good for a lot of years yet," Walter said recently. "A lot of these kids coming up from college ranks
