As a matter of fact, only a negligible number, 270, left Ireland, while 2,470 came from America to Ireland.

Paris—La Croix, Paris Catholic daily, has had occasion to correct Popular Socialist journal of this city, for attributing to the Belgian Socialist, Emile Vanderveide, a passage from an Encyclical of His Holiness Pope Pius XI. The excerpt in question is, with the exception of one word, a verbatim quotation from the official translation into French of Quadragesimo Anno.

La Paz, Bolivia—A midnight Mass here marked the dedication of the huge \$500,000 Cathedral which has been in the course of construction for nearly a century. It is said the new structure has the largest organ in South America. The organ has

sixty-four registers and 4,500 pipes. Pine Ridge, S. D.—Driving to a mission chapel to say Mass for his Indian congregation, the Rev. A. J. Keel, S. J., skidded with his auto off a narrow rough bridge and plunged into Wounded Knee Creek, 12 feet below. The missionary came through without a scratch. The auto was wrecked. At times, Father Keel travels 80 miles on a single sick call.

Madrid—The municipal authorities at Cuencu, a N.C.W.C. Special Cable dispatch states, have imposed a tax on the ringing of church bells ranging from 100 pesetas per annum, for a parish church, to 12 pesetas for a convent and 10 pesetas for a chapel located within a radius of a mile and a quarter of the town. The ordinance also levies a tax of 100 pesetas for less pretentious ones.

Infection Contracted From Dying Soldiers Kills Chinese Nun

Ningyuanfu, Szechwan Province, China.—Sister Mary Josephat, a Chinese Sister of the Franciscan Missionaries of Mary, died a short time ago in the little hospital of Ningyuanfu from an infection contracted while caring for a group of dying soldiers. The notorious freebooter, Captain Yu, had been harassing the Christians in this section for some time, but stopped recently after receiving a severe drubbing from an army of Lotos. With the cessation of hostilities a group of Franciscan Missionaries of Mary was sent to comfort the townsfolk of Tetchang. They

distributed medicine, looked after the sick and dying and administered a number of baptisms. A great number of dying soldiers were sent there by the military commanders who ordered the ordinary patients away. While tending these dying soldiers, Sister Mary Josephat contracted the malady which ended a few days later with her death.

At her funeral the pagans of the district were loud in their praise of the noble example of Christian charity given by this sister and her companions.

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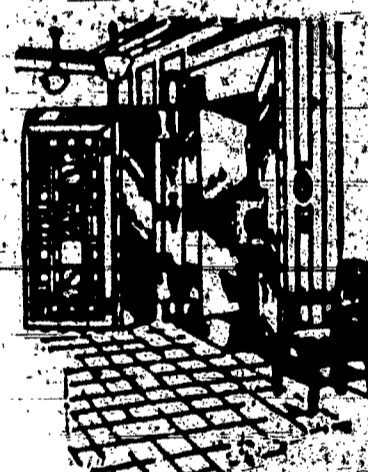
