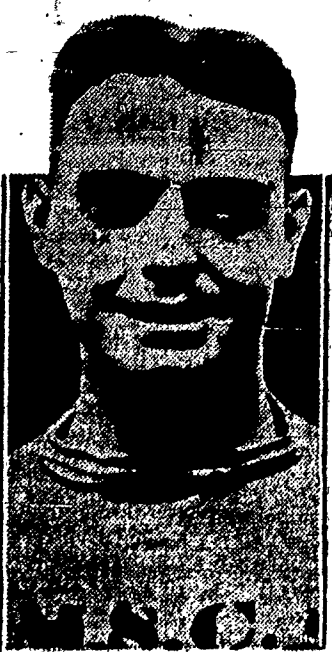


Supper in Blessed Sacrament Hall Planned by Catholic Women's Club

Solemn high Mass of Requiem was celebrated at St. Joseph's Church by the Rev. Edward J. Crowley, C.S.S.R., assisted by the Rev. Charles Burger, C.S.S.R., as deacon, and the Rev. John Lynch, C.S.S.R., as subdeacon. The Rev. Gerald Brennan, pastor of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Church, and the Rev. John M. Duffy, diocesan director of Catholic Education, were present in the sanctuary.

Mrs. Lockwood is survived by her husband, Charles Lockwood, three sons: Father Lockwood, of Charlotte, Mich.; George A. and Charles E. Lockwood of Rochester; one daughter, Mrs. Arthur L. Maurer; and four grandchildren.
