The official announcement made last week that Glenn (Judge) Carberry, an assistant to Jimmy Crowley at Fordham University next season, was good news to the host of friends that the Judge has in Rochester. The former Notre Dame star came to this city after the expiration of his contract at St. Bonaventure's College, and for a season handled the Husker semi-pro eleven. Afterwards he was affiliated with the Physical Culture Department of the Elks. Judge is popular and will make friends as easily at Fordham as he did at Michigan State where he assisted Crowley for three years.

Crowley will revamp the Fordham squad, according to his own admission, made recently. He says men who are now guards may be ball-carriers, and that halfbacks may be returned into tackles. In this respect Crowley is emulating the characteristic of the late Knute Rukkie, who made centers out of ends, and ends out of fullbacks, with the maximum degree of success. Cannon, a few years ago the outstanding lineman in college football, a man who made All-American two years running, was fullback in high school. Little Bert Metzger, another All-American Notre Dame guard, was a quarter back in his prep days, while Jim Moynihan, one of the greatest centers ever to grace a gridiron, was converted after entering Notre Dame from a wing man. It will be interesting to see whether the coming season will see the return of Rukkie in switching players to new positions.

Fordham, by the by, is the first college to call out baseball candidates. The Ram diamond aspirants, under Coach Jack Coffey, start warming up on March 1. Fordham faces a difficult schedule of eight games, and the indoor workouts begin this season much earlier than usual. Fordham lost but three men from the 1932 team, all outfielders, and will start the coming campaign with a world of experienced battery material.

Two boxing celebrities, both fine Catholic men, passed away during the past week. "Gentleman Jim" Corbett, perhaps the greatest boxer the ring has ever known, and Ernie Schaaf, an up and coming youngster, and one of the most promising heavyweights of the present day. Corbett was 67 and died of cancer, which perhaps was a blessing. Schaaf, to this writer, was the victim of the selfish, dollar-hungry fight promoters, who allowed him to enter the ring against Primo Carnera in the poorest physical condition.

Schaaf had been ill with influenza, and the autopsy disclosed that his body was "soft," the result of illness and lack of preparation for the fight. A sick man cannot train properly and Schaaf, had he been able to tell his story after he had been knocked out, might have admitted that he was in

no condition to oppose the Venetian Giant. The deplorable aspect of the fight was the fact that for days prior to the engagement between Schaaf and Primo, sports writers bally-hooded that the fight was a frame-up, and that Schaaf was to lose. Even after Ernie had lapsed into a state of coma and had been forced to submit to an operation to remove a blood-clot from his brain, the same wisecracks insisted that Schaaf, in the hospital, was "carrying on the act." The aftermath of it all, Ernie's death, we hope, will trouble the consciences of those "smart aleck scribes," of whom there are none smarter than those in the metropolis to their way of thinking—and writing.

The Aljo basketball team, of the Rochester District League, turned things-in-general topsy turvy the past week by beating Spencerport, at Spencerport. Jimmy Nolan, crack Al, Carmel athlete, tallied 18 points for the I. Y. M. A. last Sunday night. Jimmy is having a great season. Tommy Burns, former Notre Dame guard, is a team-mate of Nolan's on the I. Y. squad. The G. Y. Ramblers and the Ebers broke even in two engagements. Ebers are a 3 to 1 shot to again win the R. D. A. championship.

Beginning with Ash Wednesday, special services will be held for the Deaf in St. Francis de Sales Chapel during the holy season of Lent. The chapel is located in the auditorium of St. Joseph's Hall, Franklin Street, and North Clinton Ave.

The services will begin at 8:00 p. m. and close with Benediction of the Most Blessed Sacrament at 8:45 p. m. A special feature of these Lenten Services will be the "Question Box" questions on matters pertaining to Faith and Morals will, at first, be clearly proposed and tersely answered. Thereupon, the same question and answer will appear, with vital and practical conclusions drawn from such a method and style of preaching. This method will enable the Deaf to state their doubts and difficulties on matters of their Faith and to receive proper and correct instruction on the same. For this reason and because of Lent, a season of prayer, devotion and penance, all Catholic Deaf of Rochester are urged to attend these Lenten Services held in their own devotional chapel for their own spiritual welfare.
