Pres. Mac Sweeney Declares Legal Aid Service Needed Now

At the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Directors of the Rochester Legal Aid Society, the introduction of Assembly Introductory 814 by Assemblyman Neustein, the passage of which would do away with Legal Aid Societies in New York State, was vigorously protested.

In making this protest, the directors pointed out that in the past ten years the Rochester Legal Aid Society has handled 17,007 cases for poor persons who were or otherwise would be dependent upon public relief and collected or saved for these persons more than three times what it has cost to operate the society.

In calling this to the attention of the public, Joseph P. MacSweeney, president, stated, "At any time, but especially during a time of widespread unemployment and economic distress, the elimination of a service which brings justice within the reach of the poor man and which makes available to him necessities of life which he otherwise would be denied, would be unthinkable."

The proposed bill seeks to amend Section 280 of the Penal Law which forbids the practice of law by corporations and voluntary associations by striking out the exception in the present law under which the Legal Aid Society operates.

Emory A. Brownell, as executive attorney, reported that in January the society handled 490 cases, made 45 court appearances and held 436 interviews. Domestic relation cases constituted the major problem coming to the society, with wage claims and landlord and tenant cases almost as numerous.

CHARLES J. GUERIN

The funeral services of Charles J. Guerin, photographer, who died Wednesday, February 22, at his home, 81 Nicholson Street, were conducted Saturday morning at Our Lady of Victory Church, Pleasant Street.

Solemn high Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Camiel A. Van der Meulen, C. SS. CC., assisted by the Rev. George J. Schmitt as deacon and the Rev. Leopold Jeurissen, C. SS. CC. as subdeacon.

Members of the Faan French Club served as honorary bearers. Active bearers were Fred Richee, Henri Lecompe, Jules Charland, Charles Guerin, Joseph Trepanard and Joseph Kramer.

Burial was in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery where the final blessing was pronounced by Fathers Van Der Meulen, Schmitt and Jeurissen.

Mr. Guerin's life was a continuus one of devout labor in the service of his family, his neighbor and his God. Born at St. Nicholas, Quebec, he came to the United States about 40 years ago and worked unknown to the world in retouching thousands of photographs appreciated by the public.

For more than 35 years, he was a fervent and faithful member of Our Lady of Victory Church, a zealous promoter of all parish activities, an intrepid organizer of the French Benevolent Club of which he was a charter member and treasurer until he died. For 17 years he was collector and trustee of Our Lady of Victory Church. He was one of the first in Rochester who had the Enrollment of the Sacred Heart of Jesus in his family performed.

Sisters of Charity Attend Mass For Fr. Verdier in Hospital Chapel

Solemn Requiem High Mass was celebrated Saturday morning at St. Mary's Hospital Chapel for the Most Honored Father Francis Verdier, O.M.S. of the Congregation of the Mission, Superior General of the Vincentian Fathers and of the Sisters of Charity. Father Verdier died in Paris, January 26, 1933.

Rev. Martin J. Blake, C.M., Vice Pres. of Niagara University was celebrant of the Mass, Rev. Francis A. Meade, C.M., Dean of the University, Deacon of the Mass, Rev. Wm. J. Mahoney, C.M., Professor of Philosophy and Canon Law, was subdeacon. Rev. J. Frederick Illig, C.M., Professor of History, was Master of Ceremonies. The Sisters of Charity in charge of St. Mary's Hospital, here, attended the Mass.

French Catholics were particularly affected by the Government's official representation which they attributed to a desire to honor not only the memory of St. Vincent but the present work of the Vincentians and the Daughters of Charity.

Father Verdier is the seventeenth Superior since St. Vincent de Paul, Founder of the two Communities, who number 2,500 Priests and 3,000 Scholastics of the Congregation of the Mission and over forty thousand Sisters of Charity in all parts of the known world.

The distinguished persons in attendance at the funeral of Father Verdier in Paris once more gave evidence that the followers of St. Vincent de Paul hold a high and special place in the esteem of French people. The President of the Republic was officially represented by his Naval Aide, The President of the Council and the Minister of Foreign Affairs also sent representatives. The Mayor of Paris, made a special trip to Paris to follow the bier of the seventeenth successor of the Saint. His Eminence Jean Cardinal Verdier presided at the funeral service. The Most
