Catholic Women's Sacred Drama Cast Announced

Among the rich literary gifts of Robert Hugh Benson was the power of setting forth in very simple words but with deep intensity of feeling the great mysteries of religion in his play, "The Upper Room," which is to be produced by the Catholic Women's Club in commemoration of the nineteenth hundredth anniversary of the crucifixion and resurrection of Christ, on Palm Sunday evening, April 9, at the Columbus Civic Center, with a 3 o'clock matinee for children, he relates with profoundly moving effect the story of Holy Week. Magr. Benson, who became a Roman Catholic and who died at the age of 44, was the son of the Archbishop of Canterbury of the Church of England, and a brother of E. F. Benson, the distinguished British novelist. He has written the drama in graphic, tender, and beautifully conceived English and confined the action to the Upper Room where our Lord met His disciples for the Last Supper. In this room gather Achan, the landlord; Samuel, his youthful servant; Joseph of Arimathea; Peter; John; Judas; Longinus; the Centurion; Mary, Mary Magdalene; and Veronica, and with them as the play's characters the story of Calvary is unfolded. The cast is practically the same as that which produced the play on two separate years, several years ago for the Club, under the direction of Miss Elizabeth A. Clark. They include: The Doctor, Harry B. Crowley; A Voice, Rev. Benedict A. Ehmman; Achaz, George T. Roche; Samuel, Robert Edelman; Judas, Joseph T. Otto; Joseph of Arimathea, Emmett J. O'Neill; John, F. Leo Hogan; Peter, Robert T. Dwyer; Longinus, Paul McNamara; Mary, Elizabeth Lawless; Mary Magdalene, Blanche J. Thompson; Veronica, Margaret Hickey.

ELMIRA CATHOLIC HIGH WINS OVER AUBURN BASKETBALL FIVE

Elmira—in a return game between the Elmira Catholic High School basketball five and the Holy Family School quintet of Auburn, the brilliant passing attack of the Elmira varsity resulted in a 43 to 18 defeat for the Auburn tossers, Sunday afternoon on the SS. Peter and Paul court.

The Elmira Jayvee five also showed stellar form to defeat the Auburn juniors in a preliminary game, 35 to 9. In the main battle Auburn gained a lead of 8 to 7 at the end of the first period, but the locals came back strong and wiped out the advantage before the end of the half. The locals were close to invincible during the final two periods.

To single out any player as the "star" of the afternoon's main attraction would be impossible. Paul Riffe and the lanky, high scorer Lynch made a sure fire combination when working around the pivoting of Cummings, who looked better than he has for a long time. Supple and Dimon, the starting guards showed considerably more speed in starting an attack than heretofore, and Dowdie, upon the entry into the game maintained the pace, evidencing marked fondness for smearing the visitors' plays. Phil Riffe was not to be denied his part of the afternoon's fun. In the game for only two periods he kept the scorekeepers busy, ringing up four field goals, one from the center of the court that never touched the rim of the basket.

Poole, the Holy Family forward, got four of his team's five goals, and made good two of his four free throws. A neat player, he required careful attention by the local guards. The most stubborn problem with which the locals had to deal was the "slip" to the visitors' passing game, and made it a point to be under the hostile basket when anything was happening there. Elmira's Catholic High School and Holy Family of Auburn were formed the same year, both schools are in the Diocese of Rochester, basketball was started in both institutions at the same time, and the registration of each school comes within two or three students of being the same. That keen athletic rivalry already exists between the schools was evidenced by the large attendance at Sunday's game, and the packed house that saw the locals beat Holy Family 24-15 at the Armory in Auburn on Feb. 25.
