Ceremonies Mark Holy Year Opening In Vatican City

station, being picked up and re-broadcast throughout the world. By pressing a button in his study in the Vatican, Pope Pius XI Sunday night illuminated a gigantic cross on the summit of Mt. Scenario near Florence, thus ending an impressive series of ceremonies inaugurating an extraordinary Holy Year commemorating the death of Christ.

This incident followed by some hours the picturesque ritual in the ancient Basilica of St. Peter's which attended opening of the Holy Door, ushering in a 12-month period of prayer which the Pontiff hopes will serve to "and a depression that has lasted too long."

Hardy shepherds, lost in their mountain fastnesses, fell to their knees in awe just as other shepherds in distant Palestine more than nineteen centuries ago were struck dumb with amazement when a comet heralding the birth of the Redeemer flashed over the horizon.

In cities and towns throughout Tuscany the faithful devoutly crucified themselves as the symbol of Christ's passion sprang into flame against the black background of the sky. It announced to the world that the Holy Year, proclaimed to commemorate the nineteenth century of the redemption of mankind, had been officially inaugurated by the Pope in Rome. It called upon all the faithful, wherever they may live, to unite in fervent prayer to God that the troubles besetting all countries be removed.

The Pope, for all his 75 years, appeared vigorous throughout Sunday's long and arduous ceremony. His pale face reflected his emotions. He is determined to fulfill all the extraordinary duties the year places on him.

Patrick, distinguished apostle to that ancient land. Welcome Papal Legate. Trading the events of the Congress from the moment of the disembarking on June 20, of His Eminence, Cardinal Lauri, Papal Legate to the Eucharistic Congress, at the pier of Dun Laoghaire, where he was accorded a welcome as great as that which might have been accorded His Holiness, Pope Pius, himself had been able to come in person, the royal pomp was continued all along the eight-mile journey from the pier to the heart of Dublin itself. As the Cardinal stepped upon Irish soil, the royal salute was given by a battery of guns while a squadron of Free State airplanes, flying in cross formation, dipped low in the sunny morning in deferential greeting.

Paganry accompanying every successive step in the reverent celebration, whose special objective is a tribute of Catholic Faith in the real Presence of Christ in the Eucharist, the belief of the Catholic world in the doctrine of Transubstantiation, was depicted with fidelity and accompanying singing of the multitudes that went as pilgrims from every corner of the globe. John McCormack, who holds the rank of Count in the Papal household, sang the Panis Angelicus in the great orphedral cathedral, constructed for religious services during the Congress in Phoenix Park, Dublin; and famous choirs as well as thousands of children's voices were lifted in solemn chant during the various exercises that were an essential part of the Congress program.

YIELDING FRUITS The allocation delivered by Pope Pius XI at the Secret Consistory of Mary 13 summarily outlined the events, joyful and sad, that occurred since the consistory of June 30, 1930. After referring to the splendor attending the Eucharistic Congress of Dublin and the more recent 15th anniversary of the apparition at Lourdes, at which functions the Holy Father was represented by Cardinal Legates, Pope Pius XI points to the consoling growth of the Church.

"These great movements in the history of the Church of God and these extraordinary solemn manifestations of her life find their happy consoling counterpart in the daily uninterrupted developments of her being and her activity and in the application, ever more wide and more abundant, of the fruits of redemption among mankind. We refer to the development and increase of the ecclesiastical territories, whether in places of diocesan organization and of normally established hierarchy or in the missionary countries under missionary administration, the fruitful consoling work of three congregations, Consistories, Oriental and Propaganda, all bent upon garnering the harvest and incorporating it organically into the mystical body of Christ, a harvest of conversions among the heathen in recent days particularly select and abundant and all the more numerous where the number of the native clergy is greater.

"No less consoling are the returns, as if from homesickness, to Roman unity among non-Catholics and disidents of various Oriental rites, thanks here especially, after God, to the zeal of the Oriental Bishops and clergy and to the harmonious cooperation of the Latin missionaries and sisters engaged in apostolic work in the East, and thanks above all to the good-will, the Christian courage and often enough to the heroism of so many dear sons who have come back to their father's house.

"Valuable, really inestimable, contributions to all this spread of divine redemption and supernatural life in the world have been made and are being made with a perseverance and ardor above all praise by the Pontifical missionary organizations, and Catholic Action, was never so prompt and so active.
