Household Hints

Lettuce bags are so easily made, everyone should have them. Use fine cheesecloth and make large enough to hold a couple of heads of lettuce after it has been washed.

Stand a clothes basket on a strong camp stool when hanging out clothes. It saves many a back bend.

Onions chopped fine and sprinkled over pickled beets gives a delicious flavor. It is ideal to serve on a lettuce leaf as a beet salad or as a side dish of beets.

Do not throw away the water that corned beef has been boiled in. It is ideal to boil spring vegetables and greens in.

To soak paper off the wall, use a fire extinguisher, the small kind used in homes. It does a good job, evenly and quickly.

Molded salads are especially attractive to serve from the table as a prettily garnished mold is extremely decorative.

When planting the vegetables or flower garden, the worn-out bathroom rug will be found an excellent knee rest and protection from dirt and dampness.

Put a small quantity of sand in the bottom of the valuable vase or ornament when used for table decoration; this makes it stand more firmly and avoids accidents.

day, admitted to his presence a remarkable crowd of pilgrims in which, together with many Italians, were groups from Stuttgart, Germany; Tunis, Troyes and Paris. That audience was particularly important not only for the solemnity of the day in which it took place, but also for the presence among the pilgrims of personages of great renown. Among the pilgrims from Tunis, for example, was Father DeLattre, the illustrious archaeologist, among the German pilgrims was Count de Thunn, former president of the Austrian Cabinet.

This year to the solemnity of the Holy Year is added the circumstances for which it has been announced, the commemoration of the nineteenth centenary of the Redemption. It is natural, therefore, that Easter in this Holy Year should be celebrated with the utmost solemnity in Rome whither all Christian people are called this year to obtain more abundantly the treasures of divine grace.

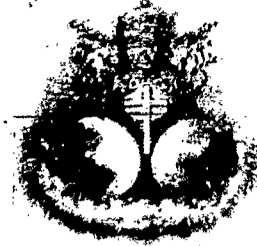

How and What To Serve Hints For the Housewife

Having devoted this space for the past few weeks to meat substitutes, let us now consider eggs as a substitute. They contain considerable albumin and this is found in white, which consists of albumin and water. When eggs are cooked the albumin in the white stiffens or coagulates. The yolk of the egg also contains a kind of protein which coagulates when heated.

Strike the egg one blow upon the surface of the table. Put the thumb together at the crack in the shell, then hold the egg upright, and gently break the shell into two parts. Then slip the yolk several times from one part of the shell to the other until all the white has run over the edge into a bowl or plate. Scrape out the shell of the egg.

When the wire spoon is used draw the spoon straight and swiftly through the egg, tilting the dish and lifting the egg beater so that the material will be turned over at each stroke. Egg whites are beaten stiff when the impression made by the beater is retained; and they become dry when the glass has disappeared and flaky bits fly off as the egg is beaten.

Beat egg thoroughly; add milk and sugar and beat again. Heat in double boiler to coagulate the egg white slightly and so increase its digestibility. Serve in a glass with nutmeg grated over the surface.

NATIVE CLERGY WORK LAUDED

Cardinal Pacelli, Secretary of State to the Pope, has sent a letter of thanks to Archbishop Salotti, Secretary of Propaganda, to express the pleasure of His Holiness on his recent circular concerning support of native priests of the missions through the Society of St. Peter Apostle. The Holy Father declares that the best missionary work is to foster and develop priestly vocations among people in mission lands, that the erection of seminaries in mission lands is the surest hope of the future. The Supreme Pontiff hopes that the faithful will generously assist the Society of St. Peter Apostle in its apostolic work.

WHERE A ROOF IS WANTED

The Rev. John W. F. Ribeiro, D. D., of Maracikara, South India, played an important part in the construction of Marvian and the latter's followers in their submission to the Holy See. For the past two years he has been engaged in building a church for his converts, but the "final touches" are now facing him.

"Begging and borrowing from my friends I have been able to finish the masonry work. And now remains the roofing, which at any sacrifice must be put up before the monsoon sets in. May I would require about \$150 and earnestly appeal to you to plead for me."

FEW CHURCHES

From Burma, a stronghold of Buddhism, comes a plea for help to build a church. It is sent by Fr. Anthony Zemi, Kengtung, Burma, India.

"Though the Buddhists have plenty of pagodas and nearly every hill is a Buddhist temple, yet many people in our district are entering the true fold. The mission has been in existence for ten years, but we have not this time been able to build a church; all we have is a house that must do duty as chapel, school, dispensary and dormitory for a number of boys. It is very sad to see our Lord in such a poor and miserable place. We are striving every nerve to build a church and hoist the cross of Christ in this land of Buddha."

This mission ranks among the most needy ones of the world and we heartily recommend this appeal. One thousand dollars will build a serviceable church.

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
