Official Rochester Diocese Pilgrimage To Holy Spots In Europe Is Announced

An official Rochester Diocese Pilgrimage to the world famous shrine at Lourdes, France, and to Rome and Liseux, will be made this summer under the leadership of Rev. Leo C. Mooney. The trip is under the auspices of the Catholic Travel League, with national headquarters located at 10 East 40th Street, New York City.

The Catholic Travel League is sponsoring an annual pilgrimage to Lourdes, and the first trip is being organized as a special event of the present Holy Year. The Rochester group will sail on July 15 in the New S. S. Champlain, of the French Line, for a 30-day sojourn at an all-inclusive price of \$295, covering every item of expense.

The pilgrimage is designed to fill a long-felt want among Catholics in the Rochester diocese and is placed for the first time within the reach of persons of moderate means. In addition, the concourse of Lourdes travelers will have at their disposal two of the finest trans-Atlantic liners. Between visits to the famous shrines, members of the party will also visit Avignon, Nice, Milan, Lucerne, London and Paris.

The Rochester group will leave New York on July 15 in the S. S. Champlain, newest addition to the French Line's fleet, and will return on the Ile de France, flagship of the same line. For those who wish to remain longer overseas, there will be an extension providing a tour of forty-one days as against thirty days on the shorter tour.

Special tourist accommodations in the French liners will be provided for the Rochester party. For the price of \$295, the following is included: round-trip steamship accommodations, tourist class, all transportation in Europe, meals, hotel reservations, couriers, sight-seeing, baggage transfer and tips to hotel staffs. The forty-one day trip is offered at an all-inclusive price of \$395.

The overseas itinerary will begin at Bordeaux, whence the party will continue to Lourdes. At the conclusion of the visit there, the group will go direct to Avignon, Nice, and Genoa, arriving in Rome on July 28.

The first two days of August will be spent at Lucerne, Switzerland, and Paris will be reached on August 3. The stop at Liseux will be made en route to Havre, from which the group will sail for New York on August 8. For those who can remain away longer, the tour will add Florence, Venice, a sail on the Rhine to Cologne, Germany, and extra days

THREE BISHOPS TO GIVE COURSES

Washington, D. C.—Three Bishops are to give courses this summer in the Apologetic Institute of the Catholic University of America at Washington, D. C., the first institute of its kind at the University. The Most Reverend Richard Oliver Gerow, D.D., Bishop of Natchez, The Most Reverend John F. Noll and the Most Reverend Edwin V. O'Hara, D.D., Bishop of Great Falls, are giving integral courses which will form part of the regular work of the institute.

A notable feature will be the exhibit of non-Catholic and anti-Catholic literature, magazines, posters, and the like. The character of Catholic apologetic literature will be examined and bibliographies prepared, and practical training given to priests in present day methods of exposition and appeal. The purpose of the institute is to disseminate among the clergy the principles and methods adapted to present religious trends, in order to combat the new errors and new misunderstandings of the Church and her position on vital questions. The Director of the Apologetic Institute is the Very Reverend Francis A. Walsh, O.S.B.

Courses are to be given by the Reverend J. B. Tenny, S.S., and the Reverend Gerald Shaughnessy, S.M., as well as by the Most Reverend Bishops. Their Excellencies, assisted by the Reverend Dr. Walsh, Director of the Institute and the Reverend Dr. Maurice Sheehy, will give a course in Practical Method of Apologetics, and a study of religious opinions in the United States. The Reverend Dr. Tenny will present an analysis of the attitude of the American mind toward the Catholic Church, and the Reverend Dr. Shaughnessy a survey of the trends of ethical opinions in the United States.
