CATHOLIC PRESS VALUE NOTED BY SCHOOL HEADS

(Continued from Page 1) There were no formally prepared papers as heretofore. Instead, the speakers led the discussion of their topics, and presented such phases of their subjects as would stimulate discussion. This new plan was a pronounced success.

The Very Rev. Msgr. F. J. Maciel, M.A., Superintendent of Schools of the Diocese of Toledo, led the discussion of the subject "An Evaluation of Catholic Educational Endeavor." This topic was presented under the following heads: (a) What Catholic schools have accomplished; (b) The proportion of pupils being reached by Catholic schools; (c) The product of Catholic schools; (d) The teaching staff of the Catholic schools; (e) The future of Catholic education.

Discussing the question "How to Make Our Schools More Catholic," the Rev. Carl J. Ryan, Ph.D., Superintendent of Schools for the Archdiocese of Cincinnati, said: "It is a matter of no slight significance that the present Holy Father and his two immediate predecessors have declared in favor of the active participation of the faithful in the liturgy of the Church, especially in the sacrifice of the Mass. Here then we have a definite objective pointed out for us. To make our schools more Catholic we must teach our children to know the Mass, to assist at Mass, in the words of Pius XI, 'not as outsiders or as dumb spectators, but as understanding truly, penetrated by the beauty of the liturgy.' Until the products of our schools understand the liturgy of the Church and participate in it, and not merely be present at the sacrifice of the Mass, we must be prepared to admit that we have not made our schools fully and truly Catholic."

The Rev. Dr. Joseph E. Wehrle, Superintendent of Schools of the Diocese of Erie, gave a complete resume of the position of the pastor and assistants in the administration of parochial schools. He pointed out that pastors are responsible to their Bishops for the education of all children in their parishes, and are therefore the recognized administrators of parochial schools.

The Rev. Dr. Joseph G. Cox, of Philadelphia, directed the discussion of the subject "The Public Press and Educational Associations as Agencies for Making Catholic Schools More Catholic."

"Retrenchment in Catholic Schools" was discussed by the Rev. Joseph P. Barbani, Superintendent of Schools of the Archdiocese of Milwaukee. Father Barbani pointed out that the present tendency is to halt building program and to make every possible use of existing educational facilities. He strongly urged that no legislation should be enacted that would add to the cost of school buildings unless such legislation produced corresponding beneficial results.

The Rev. Dr. George Johnson of the Catholic University of America, Director of the Department of Education of the National Catholic Welfare Conference and Secretary General of the National Catholic Educational Association, the final speaker on the program, gave a summary of recent school legislation, together with important trends in the administration of schools.

Other resolutions adopted at the meeting were as follows: 1. Our schools aim at the salvation of human souls and the promotion of the interests of the Catholic Church. It is reasonable to offer the opportunity of Catholic education to all Catholic children of school age. 2. Our teachers should seek their advancement in professional studies, in surroundings that are completely Catholic. 3. Reasonable evaluation of the fruits of Catholic education of all levels should be made from time to time. The shortcomings and pending developments should be viewed in the light of the fine accomplishments of our schools.

Archbishop Hanna Thinks Industrial Conference Timely

(N. C. W. C. News Service) SAN FRANCISCO.—The Most Rev. Edward J. Hanna, Archbishop of San Francisco, has just announced that the Catholic Conference on Industrial Problems will hold a regional meeting here, sponsored by himself and the Most Rev. John J. Mitty, Coadjutor Archbishop of San Francisco, on May 9 and 10.

The Archbishop says, in making the announcement, that "the time is most propitious for a meeting of this kind." "It comes to us," he says, "when earnest men and women are willing to contribute their best thought to the alleviation of the economic distress which has been pressing so heavily upon the world. A conference such as this, which is trying to point out the application of principles of Christian Charity and Social Justice to our everyday industrial life, is most welcome in San Francisco."

A committee to be appointed within a few days by the Chancery Office will lay plans for the conference. Prominent speakers, including leaders in business, labor, industry and economics, will give papers.

(Continued from Page 1) quired at the exhumation of holy bodies. One of them represented the Postulator of the Cause, detained at Rome because of illness.

The physicians charged with the recognition of the remains and all those who were to be present, first took an oath not to remove any relics. After that the lead casket was withdrawn from the vault.

In spite of the humidity of the vault, the body, to the great joy of the Daughters of Charity who were present, was found entirely preserved.

The lead casket was placed in another of oak and was taken immediately to the place at the Motherhouse where she had seen the Blessed Virgin and where she received the order to have struck the Miraculous Medal. Cardinal Verdier ordered this in response to the wishes of the Sisters in religion of the Venerable Catherine.

When the carriage which brought the precious remains appeared in front of the house, the Daughters of Charity, the priests, the postulants of the house, with the lighted candles in their hands, went to meet it chanting the psalms of the Laudes Dominicales.

The casket, carried by eight clerics of St. Lazarus, was placed in a little hall at the foot of a statue of the Immaculate Virgin.

The next day, in the presence of the Cardinal, the casket in which, for 58 years, the remains of this Servant of God reposed, was opened to permit the precious body to be seen and, with emotion and reverence, all those present attested the unaltered preservation of the body still clothed in the habit of the Daughters of Charity.

In the afternoon the physicians, after having removed the parts which are to become relics, pliously covered the venerable body and replaced it in the oak casket to await May 22, when after the solemnity of beatification, it will rest at the foot of the Virgin's statue, under the altar of the apparition.

Naming of Donovan To Scout Committee Reveals Boy Scout Progress In Auburn

Auburn—Appointment of Eugene C. Donovan as a representative of the Catholic Diocesan Committee being called by the Most Rev. Bishop John Francis O'Horn of Rochester for the purpose of furthering the Boy Scout movement in Scouting more than eight years ago in Auburn.

Since that time great progress has been made by the boys of the Catholic faith in this city and three troops have already established outstanding records. The first troop to be organized in this council under Catholic auspices was known as Troop 1 and was sponsored by St. Mary's Church. Its registration dates back to October 1924 when the late Rev. William Payne was pastor. The initial organizing troop committee was composed of Dr. C. F. McCarthy, John H. Rickard, George W. Buggy, Frank J. Leach. It is of interest to note that of the original troop enrollment, 10 have pursued work in college and eight of them remained in Scouting long enough to become Eagle Scouts.

In 1928 the troop registered under the sponsorship of the Auburn Council, No. 207, Knights of Columbus. Registered under the guidance of the K. of C. until last fall, the troop again became associated with St. Mary's Church where larger quarters were provided at Lyceum Hall. The Rev. Dr. William E. Cowen, pastor, is putting forth every effort to promote Scouting among the young men of his parish. Harry Duffy is the present Scoutmaster with the Rev. Armand Benoit acting as assistant Scoutmaster.

In November 1931 the membership of Troop 1 increased so rapidly that it was decided to form two troops and 14 Scouts transferred to Troop 12, forming the nucleus for the new troop sponsored by St. Alphonsus Church under the direction of the Rev. Frederick G. Straub, pastor, with J. Joseph Rumpf as Scoutmaster and Francis Poole and Francis Sempie as assistants.

The most recent troop to be sponsored under Catholic auspices is that of Troop 19 of St. Peter and Paul Church, which was registered in January of this year. Much of the credit toward the organization of this unit is due the Rev. Stephen Pomeroy, pastor. In three short months 16 of the Scouts were completely uniformed and are now performing a program of Scouting under the direction of Scoutmaster Joseph Kobl, Assistant Scoutmaster William J. Bider and a Troop Committee composed of Peter Namias, John Orsato and William Nuss.

William R. Cullen Past Grand Knight Hornell K. C. Dead

Buffalo—William R. Cullen, widely known in fraternal circles, especially among the Knights of Columbus and K. P. O. Elks, died Wednesday of last week here. He was 62 years of age and had been secretary of the Elks' lodge for the past 12 years. Prior to coming to Buffalo he had been grand knight of the Hornell Council, Knights of Columbus.

Mr. Cullen was a past district deputy grand exalted ruler for New York of the Elks. He was a member of the Fourth Degree ceremonial team and aided in organizing the degree in Rochester several times on classes of Knights of Columbus.

The funeral Mass took place at the Immaculate Conception Church. Services were attended by a delegation of Rochester Elks headed by Exalted Ruler Charles B. Ashton.

Mr. Cullen was noted as an orator, and besides his prominent part in the affairs of the Elks and the Knights of Columbus was in demand as a toastmaster at many business and social occasions.

Surviving are his widow, Mrs. Helen Cullen; a step-son, Donald W. Seranton; and two foster-daughters, Marie Kennedy and Mary Wall.
