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THE NOCTURNAL ADORATION SOCIETY IN AUBURN

There are two Nocturnal Adoration Societies in the Auburn Diocese: One at Auburn and one at Ithaca. Both societies were organized with the help of the officers of the Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society and the diocesan officers of the N. C. C. M.

The first annual meeting of the Auburn Society was held in the Holy Family Hall on Sunday, March 26. The Very Rev. Dean John A. Conway opened the meeting with prayer and expressed his gratification at the excellent progress made during the first year of the society.

The officers appointed for the Auburn Society for the coming year were: President, William J. McLane; Vice-President, John Stapleton; Treasurer, Hugh Kimball; Recording Secretary, John Ganey; Corresponding Secretary, Frank J. Wieschtaucher; Marshall, Alban J. Linenbach.

The Secretary made a most interesting report on the progress of the society, which started with 187 charter members, of whom 41 were dropped during the year for non-attendance, and of whom one died, leaving a balance of charter members of 145. New members were added steadily during the year to the number of 72, making a total membership of 217, made up of 91 from Holy Family Church, 70 from St. Mary's and 31 from St. Alphonsus, 24 from St. Aloysius, and one from St. Francis de Sales.

Statistics, at best, are dry reading, but the figures given by the Secretary are illuminating as showing the faithfulness with which the members attended. The total attendance was 2066 hours, the average per night 172, and the average per hour 22. The largest attendance for one night was 193 on June 25th, and the lowest attendance was 139 on March 30th, 1932; 62 members received credit for full attendance; 23 missed one meeting and 26 missed two meetings.

It has been the purpose of the officers of the Auburn Society to seek only men who realize their responsibility and will come faithfully each night. The growth therefore has not been rapid, but it has been steady, and the men who have joined in the past year have been as faithful in their attendance as the charter members.

It is also worthy of mention that the John Ganey, Secretary, and Alban J. Linenbach, Marshall, were present throughout the entire night of each adoration since the inception of the society. This unusual service was acknowledged by a rising vote of thanks at the annual meeting.

A report of the progress of the Ithaca Nocturnal Adoration Society has been furnished by Professor Hugh C. Troy, Vice-President, of Auburn Diocesan Council. This society has not been in operation a full year. The officers are as follows: President, John J. Larkin; Vice-President, Professor E. S. Savage; Secretary, Clemens J. Wilcox; Spiritual Director, Rev. George Fischer.

The society was composed originally of 32 charter members and 24 additional members have joined the ranks since the night of the first adoration. One member was dropped for non-attendance. There is now a total membership of 56, divided into 9 bands. The record of attendance of the members of the Ithaca Society is rather unusual, the average attendance per night being 55, and the average men per hour being 6, so

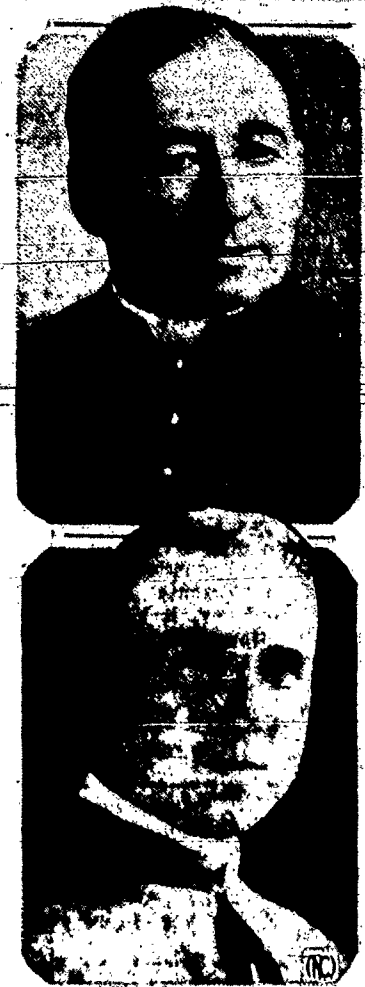
"The Cold Frame" Out About May 10

Household Hints

- A dash of Worcestershire sauce added to scrambled eggs before cooking greatly improves their flavor. Be a thorough housekeeper but do not be a fussy one. Make your home livable and not just a place to be kept neat and to work in. For quick seasoning, a large salt shaker filled with one-quarter part of pepper and three-quarters of salt, mixed, is a great help in the kitchen. Rub entire surface of block of domino sugar over the rind of a lemon which has been washed and wiped until dry. Store in a glass jar and use to sweeten and flavor tea. Slice left-over boiled potatoes, pour over some white sauce and some grated cheese, then heat in the oven ten or 15 minutes. Heat the earth that you are going to put into pots or window boxes and all insects will be destroyed. Save all the ends of the paraffin candles. They are very good to light a fire with. When making cold soap add one tablespoon each of powdered borax and ammonia to the dry dye before adding water. Soap will be better. When you are baking the empty shell for an open pie be very careful not to stretch the pastry as you lay it over the pan. Ease it in gently and trim it off a little beyond the edge of the pan to allow for shrinkage. Prick the bottom and sides with a fork so that it will not blister while baking.
