

St. Aloysius Players Will Make Debut

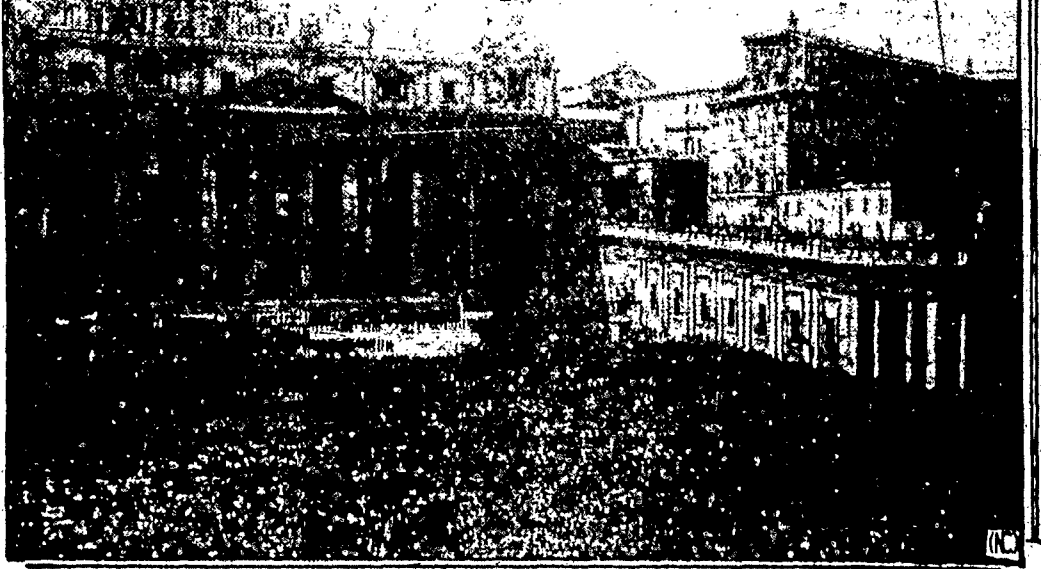
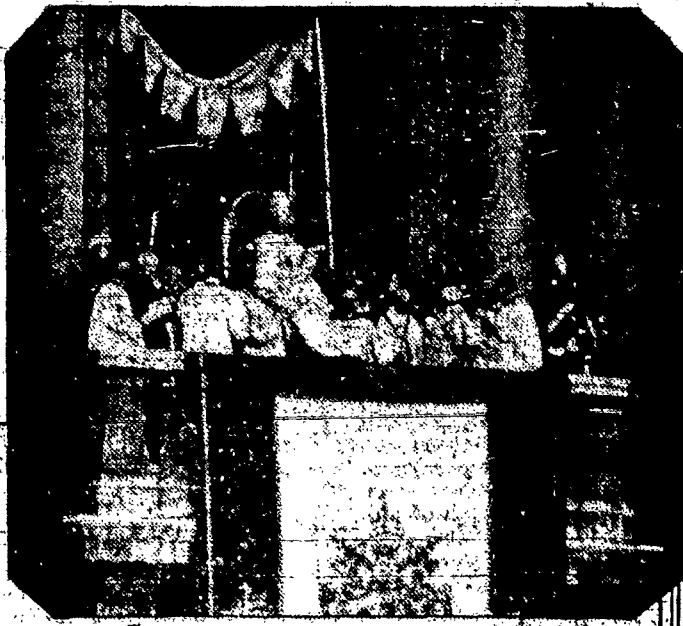

Bishop Officiates at Dedication of New Church at Ludlowville

Auburn.—His Excellency, Bishop John Francis O'Hara on Sunday morning at 10:30 o'clock officiated at the dedication of the new All Saints Church, Ludlowville, familiarly known as "Myra Chapel."

Solemn high Mass at which the Bishop presided at the throne, was celebrated by the Very Rev. John Conway, V.F., Dean of Auburn, assisted by the Rev. Dr. William T. Byrne, Ithaca, as deacon; the Rev. Jerome Holubowicz, O.M.C., Auburn, as subdeacon; the Rev. William Borgan, Auburn, master of ceremonies; the Rev. Lawrence Casey, Rochester, second master of ceremonies. The chanters were Father Jerome Holubowicz and the Rev. Frederick G. Straub of Auburn.

Music was given by the choir from Point Pleasant, near Rochester, and the Altar Boys from the Immaculate Conception Church, Ithaca, assisted in the services.

The parish at the present time has about 108 families and these countries comprise 14 nationalities. Throughout the last 20 years since the opening of Myra Chapel 39 marriages were solemnized in the church, 132 souls were baptized, 149 received First Holy Communion, 91 have been confirmed.

M. R. Gordon, who served for seven years. Following him came Rev. George M. Kalb, the present pastor.

Bishop Asks Prayers For Jews' Conversion

Thomas Heylen, Bishop of Namur, in a letter read in all the churches of his diocese and carried in the Catholic Press. Bishop Heylen, in his letter, states that the conversion of the Jews will bring about an era of peace, prosperity and happiness as yet unknown. Race hatred and bitterness, he declares, do not foster that charity and mutual confidence which His Holiness Pope Pius XI says, are required for the solution of the current world crisis.
