

HOLY YEAR IS RIDICULED IN BROADCAST

(By N.C.W.C. News Service) St. Paul, Minn.—Ridicule and suspicion were cast upon the most sacred religious sentiments of Catholics and the grotesque political burlesque was made of the current extraordinary Holy Year of Jubilee in a recent broadcast over Station KSTP here, The Catholic Bulletin charges.

"The affront to the Catholic people of the community was aggravated by the station's deceptive advance advertisement of the program," the paper says. "Frequent announcements were made daily. The public was invited to listen on Sunday to an important address on the significance of the Holy Year, but in these announcements there was no intimation as to the real character of the broadcast."

"The speaker was introduced as one Judge Rutherford, whose mischievous activities are not unknown elsewhere but from whom this region has been spared hitherto. . . Rutherford made insulting references also to the distinguished Protestant and Jewish citizens who participated in the 'Holy Hour' held at Radio City Music Hall, New York, on Sunday, April 2, in observance of the opening of the Holy Year."

"The Catholic Bulletin says that Stanley E. Hubbard, listed as vice-president and general manager of National Battery Broadcasting Company, which operates Station KSTP, was owner and operator of Station WAMD in Minneapolis, which broadcast 'a typical anti-Catholic harangue' by Hiram W. Evans, then Imperial Wizard of the Ku Klux Klan, speaking in Kenwood Armory, Minneapolis, in July, 1927. In a letter to the editor of The Catholic Bulletin following this broadcast of the Klan meeting, Hubbard justified it as a legitimate business transaction, saying that the station had been paid 'the sum of \$125 in cash prior to the broadcast.'"

William T. Nolan Takes Position In City Council

William T. Nolan of 46 Normandy Avenue, who for 10 years has held the office of general secretary of the Rochester Catholic Charities and who is also membership secretary of the Columbus Civic Center on Tuesday evening was elected as councilman-at-large at a session of the City Council, to fill the place vacated by the resignation of Charles S. Owen, now comptroller. Mr. Nolan was born in Henrietta and has been a resident of the Ninth Ward for 33 years. He was graduated from the Rochester Free Academy in 1901 and from the Rochester Business Institute in 1903. From 1907 to 1917 he was chief clerk of the Rochester Gas and Electric Corporation and has many friends among the personnel of that organization. He is married and has a son and daughter. His term as councilman will expire December 31, this year.

Mr. Nolan is active in Catholic lay organizations including Rochester Council and Fourth Degree, Knights of Columbus; Musa Caravan, Order of Alhambra, and the Nocturnal Adoration Society. He is secretary of the Laymen's Retreat, Association which arranges for annual laymen's retreats at St. Bernard's Seminary.

His most recent work consisted of a message to Mr. Nolan following his election by the City Council.

SS. Peter and Paul Auxiliary, 44 St. Peter and Paul Auxiliary, 44, affiliated with Commandery 28, Knights of St. John, was brought into existence by Stas Organes, John P. Smith who with untiring zeal, labored for a long time to establish this much needed feature of the Order. On July 10, 1898 the following women assembled in St. Peter and Paul's Hall to make application for a charter: Mrs. G. V. Meyers, Miss Margaret Haubner, Miss Loretta Freedman, Miss Mary Haubner, Miss Carrie Haubner, Miss Katherine A. Smith, Miss Magdalene Freund, Miss Anna Freund, Miss Mary Freund and Mrs. Laura Barry.

The small number and the novelty of the Order (this gathering having been the first in the City of Rochester for this purpose) seemed to arouse a feeling of uncertainty as to its prosperity. But the first regular meeting dispelled all doubts and fears on that point. The little band had brought 37 new members and from that day to this Auxiliary 44 has been a flourishing society. Its existence has been marked by a steady and healthy growth of membership, a genial and sociable spirit among its members, a disposition to obey cheerfully and promptly all directions of the Supreme Officers and the rules and regulations of the Order.

Much credit for the prosperous condition of the Auxiliary is due the first president, Mrs. George V. Meyers and her successor, Miss Louise Meyers, who labored zealously for the interest of the Order and secured the hearty cooperation of the members.

A solemn high Mass of requiem was celebrated by the Rev. Joseph E. Vogt, assistant pastor of the church. He was assisted by the Rev. Eugene Golding, chaplain at the county buildings, as deacon, and the Rev. George C. Vogt as subdeacon. The choir sang the choral parts of the Mass, directed by Prof. Philip Knechel, organist. The last blessing was pronounced by Bishop John Francis O'Horn who occupied a throne in the sanctuary during the services.

Among the members of the clergy present were the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John F. Boppel, pastor of St. Boniface's Church, and the Rev. Thomas F. Connors, pastor of Blessed Sacrament Church.

Members of the various women's organizations of which Mrs. Stallknecht had been a member were honorary bearers. The active bearers were George A. Swalbach, Albert H. Baker, John C. Waller, Frank J. Koch, Carl Popp and Jacob Magin. Mrs. Stallknecht died unexpectedly of a heart attack while talking with her husband at the jail. She had been ailing for a number of months, but recently had shown improvement.

Mrs. Stallknecht was a daughter of the late William and Theresa Rosenbach. She was born in Rochester, was educated in St. Peter and Paul's Parochial School and was married to Mr. Stallknecht June 4, 1904. She was actively interested in church and charitable work, in Ladies' Club 24 of the Elks and in other organizations including several church societies. Besides her husband, Mrs. Stallknecht leaves a son, Sarto W. Stallknecht; a sister, Mrs. Teresa Ganster, supreme president of the Women's Auxiliary of the Knights of St. John and two brothers, William H. and Clement J. Rosenbach.
