A member for two years of the Administrative Committee of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, the executive body of the hierarchy of the United States, he was familiar in a special way with the aims and purposes of the Department of Lay Organizations. The Bishops regarded the unity of the Catholic Laymen of the United States as a legitimate purpose of, and indeed a necessary step toward the accomplishment of, any comprehensive program of Catholic Action. That unity he sought to secure by bringing all the Men's Lay Societies in the Diocese into contact with each other in the Diocesan Council.

No one realized better than he that the basis of all Catholic Action in which laymen participate comes as a result of the striving for personal Christian perfection, and it is therefore quite fitting that the first work which he laid out for the Rochester Diocesan Council was of a spiritual nature. Weekly Calendar Of Feast Days

(N. C. W. C. News Service) Sunday, June 4.—St. Francis Caracciolo, born of a princely family, after being miraculously cured of leprosy left his home to study for the priesthood. He founded an Order of Clerks Regular who maintained one of their number always in perpetual adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. He died in 1608.

Monday, June 5.—St. Boniface, Bishop and Martyr, was born in Devonshire in 680. Receiving authority from the Pope, he preached the Faith in Bavaria, Thuringia, Hesse, Frisia and Saxony. While waiting to administer confirmation to some newly-baptized Christians, he and his attendants were attacked by a troop of pagans. The saint forbade his attendants to offer resistance and he and fifty-one others were slain.

Tuesday, June 6.—St. Norbert, Bishop, after leading a life of disipation at the Court of the Emperor Henry IV that was a scandal to his sacred calling, repented and established the Canons Regular or Premonstratensians who were to unite the active work of the country clergy with the obligations of the monastic life. In 1128 he was named Bishop of Magdeburg.

Assured by diocesan officials that it would be the wish of Bishop O'Hern that the program be carried out as originally scheduled, the committee headed by District Deputy John A. Doyle met last night to arrange for the reception and entertainment of delegates next week.

It is expected that Lieutenant Governor M. William Bray, a past Grand Knight of Utica Council, will be present for the convention proceedings and take part in the street parade from Columbus Civic Center, convention headquarters to St. Patrick's Cathedral on Friday, June 8.
