Lawrence Rombaut, Noted Chemist, Dies in New Jersey

A former professor in several of the leading Catholic universities and a chemist well known in his profession, Lawrence Rombaut, 33, of Carteret, N. J., and a native of Rochester, was buried Thursday of last week following a prayer service at 300 Cumberland Street.

He died in St. Elizabeth's Hospital, Elizabeth, N. J., and the funeral Mass was celebrated by the Rev. Father Channery on May 31 in Carteret.

Born in Rochester, May 6, 1900 he was graduated from Carthage School No. 8, East High School and the University of Rochester, class of 1921 with a B. A. degree. During the World War he served for a year and was discharged with a corporal's rank.

Following the war he entered Notre Dame University and obtained a Master of Science degree. After another course at Fordham University, Omaha, where he was professor in mathematics.

After a period with the Edison Company—New York, N. Y., he joined the Warner Chemical Company as chief chemist in 1930.

In September, 1922 he married Miss Marion Gallagher of Rochester who survives with three children, Doris, Alvin and Evelyn.
