Ferrari Real Hero Ferrari was the game's feature performer, however, despite all of Streb's timely hitting. Tony, who hasn't lost a League game this season, and who had a string of five whiffs dangling from his belt before the big fray Sunday, allowed the 1932 champions three measly hits, and but one man reached third base on him during the entire nine innings.

In only one inning, the eighth, was Ferrari in difficulties, and the manner in which he extricated himself from the trouble, was the scintillating work of the morning. Bleier started the eighth with a hit to shortstop which Ernie Rebmán fumbled long enough to permit the Holy Rosary catcher to reach first. Joe Witzigman, who went to the hill in the sixth in place of Barney Agness, singled along the right field foul line, sending Bleier to third. Witzigman stole second, and the Rosary followers whooped it up. But "not for long" did the cheering last. In the end it resembled a whisper, for Ferrari whiffed Farrell for the first out. "Chuck" Lucia batted for Mooney, and he, too, fanned the ozone. Then to end the anxiety of the St. Andrew rooters, Tony forced Pulvino to pop a weak fly to Rebmán. What a hand Tony got from the crowd!

The St. Andrew outfit had few chances afield. The outfield had no putouts, for only the singles by Witzigman and Zellar went beyond the infield. What chances they had were handled cleanly, except Ernie Rebmán's fumble, which did no harm. Blum, at short, for Holy Rosary, came up with a couple of pretty plays on hard hit balls, and Joe Witzigman pitched beautifully after Barney Agness retired. Agness pitched good ball, and the four runs scored off him were all made after two were out. Cleaner infield play would have shut off the two runs in the fifth, but Kremble erred to allow them on a play that would have retired the side.

Calling upon all present, to breathe a silent prayer for the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern, declared "a father, guide, leader and friend of the Knights of St. John and Ladies Auxiliaries, the Rt. Rev. Msgr. John P. Schellhorn, regimental chaplain of the Rochester Regiment, concluded the services marking the annual Field Mass in Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Monsignor Schellhorn celebrated the Solemn High Mass assisted by the Rev. Dr. Joseph H. Gefell, chaplain of Holy Family Commandery and the Rev. Dr. J. Emil Gefell, chaplain of St. Peter and Paul Commandery. Students of St. Bernard's Seminary aided the minor offices. Responses were sung by the Knights of St. John Choir under the direction of Professor Frederiek C. Pohl.

The Mass was celebrated on an open air altar especially designed for the occasion.
