

Rev. John F. Muckle's Three Brothers Assist At His Silver Jubilee Mass

Assisted by three of his brothers, all ordained priests, the Rev. John F. Muckle, pastor of St. Thomas Church, St. Paul Boulevard and Cole Road, on Sunday celebrated solemn high Mass commemorating the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination.

St. Thomas Church was filled to overflowing for the Jubilee Mass. Participating in the Mass with the jubilant celebrant were: the Rev. Charles E. Muckle, pastor of St. Agnes Church, Avon; the Rev. Joseph T. Muckle, C.S.B., of St. Michael's College, Toronto; and the Rev. William D. Muckle, J.D., rector of St. Michael's College, Toronto.

The sermon for the occasion was delivered by the Rev. William P. Ryan of St. Bernard's Seminary. Father Ryan eloquently discoursed upon the Holy Priesthood, its obligations and privileges, and recalled the opportunities accepted by Father Muckle during his twenty-five years as a priest in the service of God and the children of God. The speaker also paid tribute to the fine Catholic tradition of the Muckle family.

Father Muckle was born in Middlesex, Yates County, January 13, 1882 and after completing his elementary and high school studies was graduated from the Danville High School in 1899. His studies in preparation for the priesthood were made in St. Michael's College and in St. Hyacinth's, St. Andrew's, and St. Bernard's Seminaries. After his ordination by the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., June 6, 1908, he was appointed procurator of St. Bernard's Seminary by the late Bishop McQuaid.

Three years later he was appointed assistant at Holy Rosary Church where he assisted the late Rev. James Day until his appointment to St. Francis de Sales Parish, Geneva, September 4, 1913. In Geneva besides assisting in the regular parish work, Father Muckle was principal of St. Francis de Sales High School in which he taught religion, science and Latin.

On July 1, 1922, Father Muckle was appointed by the Most Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, D.D., to take charge of the establishment of a new parish in the rapidly growing northwestern section of Irondequoit. The present church property on St. Paul Boulevard was secured in the same month and St. Thomas parish was canonically erected July 31, 1922. Father Muckle became pastor on that day and under his guidance there has arisen a rectory, convent and a combination brick building affording accommodations for a church, school and hall.

Father Muckle was the recipient of many congratulations following the Jubilee Mass including those of his father, Thomas Muckle of Stanley and his eight brothers and sisters.

demonstrate why the association is opposing sexual education in the schools. In the course of the conversation, the Governor charged that there are political enemies of the Government within the ranks of the association.

The committee declared that the program of sexual education imposed in the Official Normal School is not only fraught with danger but that neither the institution nor the faculty is capable of imparting this instruction satisfactorily. The committee urged that such matters be left to the parent who, they contended, could use some judgment as to how and when this information should be imparted. They asked that meanwhile a commission be appointed to study and to discuss thoroughly this very delicate subject.

The Governor of Puebla promised to take the matter under advisement. In a recent interview, General Plutarco Elias Calles displayed considerable pessimism as to the success of the Revolution in Mexico. In the course of this interview, he made statements to the effect that the unreasonable demands of the Syndicate of Railway Workers were responsible for the heavy losses and present financial plight of the National Railways and also had hindered the opening up of great tracts of land for agricultural purposes which might be tapped by the railroads.

The Syndicate has issued a respectful and carefully worded denial of these charges, in which it expresses surprise at these declarations of General Calles, declaring that no contract was proposed for the construction of the line connecting Puebla with Puerto Angel. The Syndicate is desirous, the statement says, that a definite proposition be made for the construction of the said project, and refers General Calles to the headquarters of the National Railway to check the accuracy of its statement that since 1928 about 14,000 railway employees have been laid off.

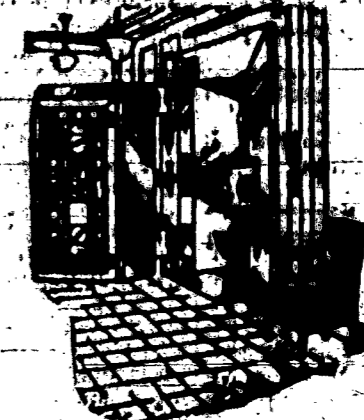
