Laymen's Retreat League To Attend Memorial Mass For Bishop O'Hern

A Memorial high Mass for the repose of the late Bishop O'Hern requested by the Laymen's Retreat League will be offered by the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Sunday morning, July 9, at 11 o'clock.

A section of the center aisle of the Cathedral will be reserved. President John P. Keating invites all retreatants and all former retreatants to attend. A special invitation is also extended to members of the Rochester Nocturnal Adoration Society to be present.

At a meeting of the Laymen's Retreat League held on Sunday, June 25, 1933, the following Memorial on the death of Most Reverend John Francis O'Hern, D.D., the Bishop of the Diocese of Rochester, N. Y., was unanimously approved:

"Each of us has an allotted time of life known only to God. At its completion, there comes the transition from time into eternity. Life's value is not determined by years but by deeds. Bishop O'Hern, was called to his heavenly home on May 22, 1933. His demise, we regret, but bow in submission to the will of the Author of Life and Death. We thank God for his life which was verily a benediction. He was born at Olean, N. Y., June 8, 1874. He attended the parochial school of Olean, and finished his preparatory studies at St. Andrew's Seminary St. Bernard's Seminary here and the North American College at Rome where the scenes of his philosophical and theological training. He was ordained in Rome, February 17, 1901. His early labors were with the people of the Immaculate Conception Parish in Rochester, St. Mary's Parish in Auburn, and the Cathedral Parish. He became pastor of the Cathedral in 1909, Pastor of Corpus Christi Church and Vicar General of the Diocese in 1923, was made a Domestic Prelate by Pope Pius XI in 1924, Apostolic Administrator of the Diocese in 1928. St. Joseph's Day in 1929 saw his consecration as the Third Bishop of Rochester. He gave four years of most intense devotion to the development of his Diocese, following in the ways of his two distinguished predecessors. Rochester has lost its most beloved and valued citizen; and the Church one of its most devoted workers and the Laymen's Retreat movement a loyal and generous friend.

"Conscious of the good that he had done and of the void that his death has made, the Laymen's Retreat League has adopted the following Resolution:

"RESOLVED: That we hereby make record of the loss we have suffered and the sorrow that has come to us in the death of our Bishop, our beloved shepherd and leader, The Most Reverend John Francis O'Hern, D.D. That we pledge, as a memorial to him, our continued and constant devotion to the promotion of the Laymen's Retreat movement in the Diocese of Rochester. That we extend to his Brother, The Reverend Thomas J. O'Hern, and the other members of his family, our sympathy, which is most heartfelt because it comes from a consciousness of our own loss and sorrow; and be it further—

RESOLVED that these resolutions be spread upon our Minutes and that a copy of them be given to the family.
