REMARRIAGE BAN IS URGED BY BAR HEAD

Clarence Martin in N. E. A. Talk Advocates Tightening Marriage Laws

Chicago.—Delegates to the convention of the National Education Association here were told by Clarence E. Martin, president of the American Bar Association and prominent Catholic layman, that divorced persons should be forbidden to marry again. "We have divorce by agreement, as proposed recently before a session of the Association for the Advancement of Science, already exists in America. Nearly nine-tenths of the divorces granted in this country in 1930 were uncontested cases," Mr. Martin said. "We have divorce by agreement. While not so bold or open as in Russia or Mexico, it is just as effective. Advocating a tightening of the marriage laws, Mr. Martin said: "Banns should be published, migratory divorces prohibited, and Gretna Green abolished. One-third of our divorces now remain. Remarriage should be limited to cases of annulments on grounds existing at the time of marriage."

THE CATHOLIC WORLD OVER

Pleasantville, N. J. (NCWC)—A sun dial erected to the memory of the late Bishop John Joseph McMahon of Trenton was unveiled and blessed on the lawn of the Lyceum of St. Peter's parish here recently.
