WOMAN REPORTS LOURDES CURE IN PALATINATE

Mrs. Hoefler had been suffering for many years under various ailments. For the last three years she had to stay abed without interruption. Inflammation of her lungs was coupled with serious intestinal and bladder troubles which made necessary several operations. Her throat was paralyzed to such an extent that she could hardly eat.

In Lourdes, the first water she took from the miraculous fountain caused her nausea. But, on the evening of May 13, she was able for the first time to take food again. When the pilgrimage left Lourdes, on May 18, Mrs. Hoefler was still lying on her stretcher, apparently seriously ill. She could not even sit up. Suddenly, however, while the train was in motion—it was 5 o'clock in the morning—she spoke to her companion and said: "I think I can walk."
