Recording the Activities of Rochester Parish Sodality Union

In the last issue of "The Queen's Work" there appeared an article which is of interest to the Catholics of Rochester and particularly to the Sodality and the pastors of churches. It reads thus:

"Looking forward to the time when they will be directing parish Sodality, the seminarians of St. Bernard's Seminary, Rochester, New York, are now studying methods of Sodality organization. They have organized two informal Sodality academies among the theologians who represent many dioceses of the country.

Because of the crowded and important curriculum the meetings are held during recreation hour. The men give this time voluntarily. The meetings are of the discussion type. They are held for half an hour once a week.

Since they all recognize the possibility of their appointment as Sodality directors, they want complete information about Sodality work and want to be familiar with the sources of all possible information and help. They believe that the Sodality has an important place in the Catholic action program of the Church because it: (1) energizes the youth of the parish. (2) Spiritualizes their work and inspires virtue. (3) Is an ideal parish society. (4) Is modern, complete, comprehensive, respects the better part of man (his soul) and applies the age-old remedies of the Church to meet the needs of the day.

The text-book now being used is "Parish Sodality Helps." Before each meeting, the assigned chapter is read by all. At the meeting it is commented upon by the lecturer of the day. Questions are asked, discussed and answered. Lecture notes from the Summer School of Catholic Action, from current Sodality literature and from "The Queen's Work," are used as supplementary material. The Semester Outline is also used and is made adaptable to the parishes.
