By ALEXANDER M. STEWART (Continued from Last Week) Call to Kips Island and Cayuga

On the 2nd of August, 1657, this party, one week on its way, fell into a tragic dispute. All the Huron men were killed, unwanted women and children were burned at the stake.

The country which Fr. Menard saw during his residence among the Cayuga villages was described in a letter dated June 24, 1672, written by Fr. Peter Raffet, who was then in charge of the Cayuga villages.

It lies between two lakes (Owasco and Cayuga) and is no more than four leagues wide, with almost continuous plains, bordered by fine forests.

Four leagues from here, on the bank of the river (Seneca) I have seen within a small space eight or ten fine salt fountains.

The river Ochougen (Oswego) which rises in this lake, soon branches into several channels and attractive bays for the preservation of hunting.

Using our inner eye we see Fr. Menard with his paddlers passing up and down the Seneca River between the villages.

We see him busy day after day, teaching, persuading and gently reproving. We perceive the passing of the seasons, the winter cold, the drip of the rain on the roof of the cabin.

A Message from Onondaga Into the midst of this busy life came a messenger from Onondaga.

Arrived at Onondaga he was told that three members of the colony had been murdered by some Onondaga Indians and that Indians had been killed in punishment and also that the Mohawks and the pro-Dutch or anti-French party had never been satisfied with the colony located in Onondaga.

A dying Huron had confessed a plot to massacre all the Frenchmen. Remaining at Onondaga meant torture and death for everybody.

M. De Puls, executive head of the colony, had made an ingenious plan. A young man who had won the affections of the chief had been instructed to go to the chief and tell that he (the young man) had dreamed that the French had given a great feast to the Onondagas and that he also dreamed that terrible calamities would fall on the Onondagas if the feast was not held.

Dreams were absolute commands from the spirit world to the Indians. So all other plans had to be set aside in order that the Indians might obey the requirements of the dream.

From this point we look back and think of all the long toilsome journeys which Fr. Menard had made in loyalty to his ideal.

Mass Said After 345 Years Where Priests Died As Martyrs

London — (N.C.W.C.) — Three hundred and forty-five years ago two priests were arrested at Padley Hall and taken out and martyred.

Recently the Mass was said again in Padley chapel for the first time since that tragedy.

A member of the family which owned the hall in that remote day served to-day's Mass. He is Cuthbert Fitzherbert. The chapel has been used for various purposes during more than three centuries.

Later the Bishop of Nottingham, the Most Rev. J. F. McNulty, pontificated at High Mass and Ronald Knox preached. The chapel will become a regular place of pilgrimage.

Seattle's Bishop-Elect Honored At Dinner

Washington — (N.C.W.C.) — Four Bishops and a distinguished company of priests and educators were present at a dinner in honor of the Most Rev. Gerald Shaughnessy, S.M., Bishop-elect of Seattle, tendered Wednesday by the Rev. Dr. Maurice S. Sheehy, assistant to the rector of the Catholic University of America here.

Chinese Eucharistic Crusaders Hold Meet

Shanghai — (N.C.W.C. Files) — Six hundred and twenty-three Chinese boys and girls, Eucharistic Crusaders of the Vicariate of Nanking, gathered at Zilawel for a Congress. They sent a telegram to the Holy Father to express their homage, to promote prayers for his intentions and for the new Chinese Bishops and to declare their purpose to promote Catholic Action.

At the Ofertory of the Congress Mass each group leader came forward to lay at the feet of the Bishop a little bamboo basket with grains of wheat inside, each grain representing a prayer.
