In conjunction with the celebration, a social and bazaar is to be held on the eighth and ninth of September. All the usual booths will be erected on the school grounds and in the school building located at the corner of North Plymouth and Brown Streets.

The members of the Young Ladies' Sodality will erect a Shrine in honor of Bernadette of Lourdes on the school grounds. The young ladies will also sell miniature rose buds as souvenirs of the anniversary.

BENEDICTINE, CONVERT, JOINS CARTHUSIANS

London—Dom Aelred Carlyle, who, 20 years ago, stirred all England by leading practically a whole community of Anglican monks into the Catholic Church and becoming a Benedictine Abbot, has just entered the famous Carthusian monastery of Miraflores, Burgos, Northern Spain, as a postulant.

He passed through England a few days ago on his way back from the Canadian Diocese of Vancouver, where he had been working for 13 years as a missionary.

Although his former community, which had its abbey on Tenby Island, South Wales, copied the Benedictine Rule in their Anglican days and joined the Benedictine Congregation on their conversion, Dom Aelred, it has just been revealed, has wanted to live the solitary life of a Carthusian ever since he was a boy of 15. The former Benedictine Abbot is at last realizing his wish at the age of 59.

The Catholic Schools of the diocese of Rochester will open for the fall semester on Tuesday, September 5.

"It is expected that the Catholic schools will have even a larger enrollment this year than last," said the head of the diocese, Rev. John M. Duffy, M. A., diocesan director of Catholic Education upon his return from Europe. "Father the finer and higher qualities of the Duffy today released the following statement regarding Catholic education."

"It is hoped that Catholic parents will sense the importance of an education for their children which takes into account not only the physical and mental aspects but also the moral and spiritual. It is not necessary here to remind a genuine Catholic that a child of mediocre physical and mental equipment may become a good citizen and great saint, but a child who is not guided by the proper moral and spiritual principles will have a difficult task to enter the kingdom of heaven."

Better Adapted for Study
"Nor do we admit that the pupils who attend Catholic schools sacrifice anything intellectually or practically because they happen also to learn moral and spiritual lessons. The records of Catholic pupils, the scholars, athletes, and the state and national prizes won by them, all give eloquent testimony to the character of the work given and demanded in Catholic schools. Dedication of "Rene Menard" Bridge Takes Place Labor Day

The official designation of the name of the recently completed bridge over the Seneca River on the Auburn-Seneca Falls Highway, by an act of the extraordinary session of the State Legislature, which adjourned on last Thursday, will have its complement in a formal ceremony of dedication, which will be carried out at the bridge on Labor Day afternoon.

The Legislature in its closing session decreed that the bridge "shall be known and designated as the Rene Menard Memorial Bridge to commemorate the bravery and beneficence of Rene Menard, a Christian missionary, the first white settler in the district now included in Cayuga and Seneca counties."

The ceremony on next Monday afternoon will mark the fulfillment of the wishes of many thousands of citizens of the Finger Lakes Region, who during the past four months have expressed their will in that regard by amassing their signatures to petitions to that effect, which were in July forwarded to the State Authorities in Albany. The act of the Legislature was made necessary by a recent decision of the State Attorney General Bennett, that in view of the precedent in the case of the Albany-Kensel Bridge, recently officially named "The Parker F. Dunn Memorial Bridge," it was not permissible to give an official name to the Seneca River Bridge without an act of the Legislature. His Excellency, the Most Rev. Edward A. Mooney, Archbishop of Cincinnati, Delegate to Japan, was named by His Holiness Pope Pius XI, fourth Bishop of Rochester according to word received from the Holy See. The distinguished, internationally known prelate, educator and statesman, will succeed the late Bishop John Francis O'Hern, whose untimely death on May 28, shocked the diocese.

From various sources it is known that in which the Most Rev. Edward A. Mooney's influence has been felt since his appointment as Bishop of Rochester. His achievement of him who is to become Shepherd of the Rochester Diocese stood due to his deep learning, capability and personality.

Word from Washington states that Archbishop Mooney will retain the title of Archbishop, at Rochester, of that in the new post his title will be Archbishop-Bishop of Rochester.

In Well Known

Upon the first notification of the appointment of Archbishop Mooney, the Rt. Rev. Magr. William M. Hart, Vicar Capitular of the diocese, said: "Archbishop Mooney is one of the leading prelates of the Church, has done good work wherever he has been stationed and is well fitted to take over and care for the duties of the diocese."

Announcement of the appointment to Rochester reached Archbishop Mooney in Seattle on his way to return to Japan after a vacation in Youngstown, Ohio, his home, and in Cleveland.

Expresses Appreciation
Shortly after the announcement was made to him Archbishop Mooney wired Monsignor Hart at Seattle: "Grateful appreciation of your kind message on occasion of my appointment as Bishop of Rochester. Your previous assistance of me in my appointment as Bishop of Rochester, and your confidence in placing in my hands the care of this diocese, is a great honor and a great responsibility."

Booked to sail last Saturday for Japan, the new Bishop of Rochester received word of his appointment following a telegram from the apostolic delegation at Washington in person his arrival. On Monday, Archbishop Mooney wired his family that he had been detained in Seattle and would advise return date to Youngstown and to make plans to attend installation.
