Music, heavenly music, should be used to tell us what the word Mother means. There is a picture in my mind right now of a mother, a woman that embodies every quality that a mother should have. She is sitting by the sea-shore; her child is with her—I would say that he is about thirty years of age. Her undivided Heart pours back into his, the lost love of virtue—and replaces despair with a strong and lasting hope. Oh, we can all call Mary the Refuge of sinners but only you Mothers can know why She is such. Only you Mothers can know the anguish of a heart that is worrying for a wayward child. But Oh! not even mothers can know the full deep sorrow of Mary's Heart when She sees Her children wandering far from Her loving arms and from the God that gave Her to them as their tender watchful Mother.
