"Wouldn't it be nonsensical for a ship to leave harbor without a chart? So is it for a student to enter upon college life, or to leave it, without an objective," the Rt. Rev. Msgr. Charles F. Shay told students of Nazareth College at their formal opening Tuesday morning.

The objective urged by Monsignor Shay was Catholic Action. "What we need most," he said, "is a body of young men and women who will go out from their colleges and actively mold the opinion of their fellow-citizens toward truth."

The feast of the Nativity of Mary, chosen as the opening day of the college year, was fittingly observed by the celebration of Holy Mass in the college chapel. Monsignor Shay, who officiated, placed the assembled students under the special care of their Mother.

The college begins its tenth year with the admission of an unusually large freshman class, numbering 70 members, bringing the total registration to 192.
