Holy Rosary To Meet St. Andrew's In Series Game

Holy Rosary and St. Andrew clubs meet Sunday at Edgerton Playground in the first of a three game series to determine the championship of the Catholic Indoor Baseball League. St. Andrews won the title for the first half of the split season while Holy Rosary, champions of 1932, captured second half honors. The big series will be played on successive Sundays.

Holy Rosary met a stiff test in coupling final half honors. Faced with the problem of winning two games in order to gain the right to meet St. Andrews, the Lexington Avenue lads defeated a strong St. Boniface team last Sunday, 5 to 2, when Hank Kremble blasted out an eighth inning home run drive with the bassocks fully populated.

Tuesday night they came through easily to win from Holy Redeemer in a one sided fray to put themselves beyond the reach of either Holy Apostles or Holy Family who finished up in a deadlock for second place. Holy Rosary's margin was a full game over both runners-up.

Joe Witzgman flashed a superior brand of ball in the twilight game Tuesday. He fanned fourteen batters in a seven inning game and allowed but two hits. Joe was simply unbeatable, and a hitting barrage, featured by circuit drives by Ed Gurdell and Kremble, decided the issue in the early innings of the contest.

Both teams are ready for the championship series. St. Andrews have a trio of fingers, Ferrar, Gerow, and Ernie Robman to pit against Barney Aenes and Joe Witzgman. St. Andrews has the seasons' edge on the Nelson outfit, having won both games played between them. Holy Rosary, however, has the best seasons' record, having won 12 of 15, while St. Andrews won 10 of 16.

The game Sunday will start at 10:30 sharp. President Lang has selected Bill McCarty as official scorer for the series.

St. Andrews Disappoint It is regrettable to this writer that some drastic measure cannot be resorted to in an endeavor to punish St. Andrew team. It was a contemptible act they perpetrated by failing to appear for their game last Sunday in order to allow Holy Family the opportunity of going into a possible three way tie for second half honors. Perhaps they were squeezing for the team that might be the softest plecting for them in the play-offs. Any way you size up the situation the Portland Avenue team grossly violated every element of good sportsmanship. Furthermore, any excuse they attempt to offer for failing to field a team on the last day of the playing schedule will simply belittle the intelligence of the loop President, Billy Lang, who, because of the diligence he has applied toward the operation of the circuit, and the success which the loop has attained, certainly doesn't deserve the treatment which the "Seaman" team has extended him. If teams are forced to post financial forfeits, St. Andrews should be penalized for the whole amount.

With over 1,000 visitors visiting the Chapel Car on the New York Central Railroad tracks, Sunday, and many more including priests, sisters, and lay people during the week, there, and again at the B. & O. R. R. station West Main Street, corner of Oak Street where the car is now stationed, the Rev. Cornelius E. Murphy of Nazareth N. C. in charge of the car expressed deep gratitude to the clergy and laity of the Rochester Diocese for what is being done for the mission work in North Carolina.

Both Father Murphy and his assistant, the Rev. John H. Rousseau of Salisbury, N. C., are busy taking people through the car which is a complete Catholic church and rectory. The chapel part with pews seats about 75 persons. There is an altar, confessional, library and living quarters and kitchen, all utilizing every bit of space available.

Mass is being celebrated on the car each morning except Sunday, at 8 o'clock and the car is open to visitors until 9 o'clock in the evening. Father Murphy has been accorded a warm welcome by several organizations interested in his work. Monday evening he addressed members of Household, 118, Order of Martha of which the Rev. Francis X. Kunz is spiritual director. The Missionary Maids of America held a reception for him Thursday of this week, at which he talked on his missionary work in the South. America held a card party for the benefit of the North Carolina Apostolate, Thursday of this week. Father Murphy is state chaplain of the Catholic Daughters of America and his Bishop, the Most Rev. William J. Hafey, Bishop of Raleigh, is supreme chaplain of the Catholic Daughters.

The Chapel Car will remain at the B. & O. R. R. (B. & P.) station until Tuesday when it will leave for Buffalo, Scranton and Philadelphia and will then proceed to the mission field.

Father Murphy who is the superior of the North Carolina Apostolate is enthusiastic about the prospects for winning converts in the State and is appreciative of all that has been done by those up North here to bring to those of the South, the consolation of Holy Mother the Church.
