NEW CABINET SEEN HOSTILE TO CHURCH

Wm. F. Montavon Believes Government of Spain Is Unlikely To Be Friendly

Washington, (NCWC) — The government which Alejandro Lerroux formed in Spain last week may be expected to be as hostile to Catholic interests as was the Azana cabinet which it succeeded. In the opinion of William F. Montavon, Director of the N. C. W. C. Legal Department and a close student of Spanish affairs, who was a first-hand observer of many of the early events in the establishment of the latest Spanish Republic.

Russian Pontificates
Paris — (NCWC) — The tradition that the Archbishop of Paris pontificates at the Mass on the Feast of the Assumption in Notre Dame was disregarded this year. His Eminence Jean Cardinal Verdier invited the Most Rev. Bohoslav Slovak Apostolic Administrator of Minsk Russia, to chant the pontifical in Notre Dame in the Cathedral on that day. Bishop Slovak recently left Russia through an exchange of prisoners between Latvia and Russia. He had spent five years in Soviet prisons.

Cobra Frightens Worshipers
Madras, India — (NCWC) — A large cobra of deadly species, over five feet long, secreted itself in the chapel at Jaganadapuram and issued forth while the Catholic villagers were at night prayers, throwing the congregation into a panic. It was killed with stones before it could bite anyone.

Envoy Sets Ashle Ban
Mexico City — (NCWC) — Ambassador Daniels has just set aside the refusal of the United States Consul to grant visas to a group of Mexican Catholic young women desiring to enter the United States for nursing study in religious institutions. The action of Ambassador Daniels followed a personal appeal from the Consul's ruling made to him by the Most Rev. Pascual Diaz, Archbishop of Mexico. His Excellency assured the envoy that the young women in question would, in no way, become public charges in the United States.

MOVE TO FEDERALIZE EDUCATIONAL SYSTEM OPPOSED BY SECULAR DAILY

Philadelphia, (NCWC) — Opposition to any move to federalize education or extension of Government control over the schools is registered in an editorial published in the Public Ledger, secular newspaper here. "Bureaucratic administration of popular education," the editorial said, "would eventually make every school board a political unit and every school an opening for Federal interference with private rights, opinions and local liberties and responsibilities. This is much too heavy a price to pay for whatever efficiency may be gained by putting the schools under National control and supporting them from the National Treasury."

FR. FISCHER'S DEATH OCCURS IN BELGIUM

Rev. Charles V. Fischer Was Prof. At St. Andrew's Seminary Here

Word has just been received by the Rev. Camiel A. Iander Meulen, C. S. S. C., pastor of Our Lady of Victory Church, of the death in Belgium on September 5 of the Rev. Charles V. Fischer who served for twenty years as a professor at St. Andrew's Seminary starting back in 1891 and who has a large circle of friends here.

Father Fischer left the United States after serving as a priest here for thirty years in Holy at Andergem, Brussels in Belgium where he died after a short illness of four days, at the age of 72 years. He was born at Audenaarde in Belgium, January 10, 1861 and was ordained to the Holy Priesthood on Pontecost, 1885 at Ghent. He was successively a professor at the College of Ecclesio and Leuven in Belgium. Then became an assistant pastor at Ledberg and came to America in 1891 to become a professor at St. Andrew's Seminary, Rochester.

During his twenty years in Rochester, Father Fischer became an intimate friend of the late Bishop Bernard J. McQuaid, companion of the late Rt. Rev. Msgr. Hippolyte De Regge and a close friend of the late Very Rev. Canon Alphonsus A. Notebaert.

In 1910 he left for Indiana to take over the pastorate of the Church of the Sacred Heart in South Bend, Indiana. Later he became pastor at Lago near Washburn. In February 1924 he left for Belgium.

Father Fischer was a Knight of the Order of Leopold II, an honor conferred upon him in Belgium. The announcement of his death has met with great sorrow among his many friends here and in South Bend.

CARDINAL SEES NRA INVOLVING U. S. WELFARE

New York — (NCWC) — The welfare of the entire nation is involved in the N. R. A., and for that reason the Act "merits the unqualified and wholehearted support of every American," declares His Eminence Cardinal Hayes, Archbishop of New York, in a statement just issued. The Cardinal's statement is as follows:

"Through the National Recovery Act our President is mobilizing and coordinating the economic processes of the nation to banish the want of recent years, to insure wider employment to our citizens under decent working conditions, to bring back the contented, orderly family life that bespeaks good morale for a country. His efforts in this regard have already reawakened the hopes and ambitions of our people. All feel that a brighter day is dawning. Because the welfare of the entire country is involved, the National Recovery Act merits the unqualified and wholehearted support of every American. "Justice, even-handed, fair and honest, not for one group or class, is its aim. For its success we pray God's blessing that our fellow-citizens may enjoy their divinely-given natural rights which too often have been denied them by relentless and unbridled competition. The task to which the Government has set its hand is complicated beyond conception. However, I am confident that with patience, tolerance and devotion to the common good, we shall see the full return of the brighter day. "May the work prosper. May it achieve the auspicious results it so abundantly promises. May it, through God's blessing, lead the country to better days and our people to a more complete life."

DELEGATE IN CANADA VISITS MARTYR SHRINE

Midland, Canada — For the first time since the Martyr's Shrine was founded a number of years ago, it was visited by the papal delegate Saturday, when the Most Rev. Andrea Gasuoli was present, celebrated pontifical high mass, and, clad in his gold and green vestments, led a thousand followers around the altitudes of the cross.

The green hill, overlooking Georgian Bay, and the River Wye, has seen many processions, and many religious services since Breubert and Lallouette were martyred there three centuries ago, but never until Saturday has it seen a service conducted by the Pope's own emissary. His excellency arrived at the shrine Saturday night, accompanied by his secretary, Monsignor Bezzotti. Mass was held yesterday in the church at 10:30. Immediately before the service, Rev. Father Lally, S. J., welcomed the delegate to the shrine in his capacity as director.

"The Roman Catholics of Canada are very, very dear to the heart of the pope," he told the congregation at the conclusion of the service. "I have crossed this country 148 times in the past, and I have seen the devotion of our people." He pleaded for unity in the church in Canada, even though a large part spoke a different language. Standing up for their church might bring suffering to them, but it was through this suffering they would win through to their reward. Music was rendered by the Jesuit choir, Toronto. Eight boys acted as thurifer; there were two acolytes, a mire bearer, a crozier bearer, a book bearer.

President of C. P. A. Is Received By Pope

Augusta, Ga. — (NCWC) — According to a press dispatch received here from Vatican City, His Holiness Pope Pius XI granted a special audience Wednesday of last week to Richard Reid, President of the Catholic Press Association of America, publicly director of the Catholic Laymen's Association of Georgia, and Editor of its official publication The Bulletin. Mr. Reid was accompanied by Monsignor Breslin of the American College, Rome.

Berlin — The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Paul Steinmann, Vicar General of the Diocese of Berlin, will act as Vicar of the Cathedral Chapter and thus be in charge of the administration of the see until a new Ordinary will have been appointed to succeed the late Most Rev. Christian Schreiber, first Bishop of Berlin. Bishop Schreiber has been buried in the crypt of the Cathedral of St. Hedwig following impressive ceremonies at which leaders in all walks of life and in all official and unofficial circles of the Capital joined with the throngs of citizens in paying a final tribute to this diocese's first Ordinary.

CARDINAL HAYES TO INSTALL NEW BISHOP AT CEREMONIES IN ST PATRICK'S CATHEDRAL

Impressive Church Services To Be Followed by Dinner for Clergy; General Reception in Evening; Welcome Arranged for Coming of Archbishop Mooney

With the Cardinal-Archbishop of New York and Metropolitan of the Province, His Eminence, the Most Rev. Patrick Hayes, D.D., presiding and in the presence of a distinguished assemblage of the American Hierarchy, the solemn ceremonies marking the installation and enthronement of His Excellency, the Most Rev. Edward Mooney, D.D., as fourth Bishop of the See of Rochester will take place in St. Patrick's Cathedral, Thursday, October 12 at 10:30 o'clock.

Decree Announces Method of Gaining Plenary Indulgence

Vatican City — (NCWC) — The September issue of the Acta Apostolicae Sedis publishes the text of a decree of the Sacred Apostolic Penitentiary announcing that His Holiness Pope Pius XI has authorized the granting of: "A plenary indulgence to be gained once a day on each day of the exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, to all those who, having confessed and received Holy Communion, pay a visit to the church in which the Blessed Sacrament is solemnly exposed either on the occasion of Forty Hours, or at some similar solemn exposition, and recite the Ave Maria, and Gloria, then one each for the intention of the Holy Father; or A partial indulgence of 15 years for each visit throughout the period of exposition to those who are at least contrite. It was announced that this decree does not in any way affect other indulgences granted in this field.

NAMED BISHOP AUXILIARY IN ST. LOUIS SEE

Washington, (NCWC) — The Rev. Christian H. Winkelmann, pastor of the Church of St. Francis de Sales, St. Louis, has been named titular Bishop of Siga and Auxiliary to the Most Rev. John J. Glennon, Archbishop of St. Louis, by His Holiness Pope Pius XI, according to word received here from Vatican City.

Bishop-elect Winkelmann has just observed his fiftieth birthday, having been born in St. Louis on September 12, 1883. His mother is still living and is 77 years of age. The Bishop-elect attended St. Boniface parochial school in his native city, and later went to Quincy College, Quincy, Ill. Her pursued his courses in philosophy and theology at Kenrick Seminary, St. Louis, and was ordained to the priesthood by Archbishop Glennon on June 11, 1907. Following his ordination, Father Winkelmann was assigned as assistant pastor at St. Peter's Church in St. Charles, Mo., and served there for 15 years. In 1922, he was named pastor of Sacred Heart parish in Rich Fountain, Mo., and remained there until May, 1929, when he was appointed pastor of the Church of St. Francis de Sales in St. Louis. This last-named parish is one of the largest in the city of St. Louis.

Vatican City — (NCWC) — More than 200 pilgrims have made the Holy Year pilgrimage to Rome on foot. The majority were past middle age, some of them over 60.

Denies Noted Convert Has Been Rejected As Priesthood Candidate

London — (NCWC) — A report that Dr. W. E. Grobstein, the famous conformist, had been rejected as a candidate for the priesthood, was denied by the London University. "The rumor is totally untrue," states the Catholic newspaper. "Dr. Orchard has never been a candidate for the priesthood, though every encouragement has been extended to him to become so. He has gone on a prolonged voyage for complete rest after the heavy strain he has undergone, and he is deferring the formation of any plans for the future until his return."
