Keeping pace with seasonal events, the Catholic Courier will cover football as played locally and in the colleges for the next two months.

However, there is much to add to the filings already written of the Catholic League. The games referred to were some that were played in 1932 and 1933. No box scores of other years were available, but more hand-picked scores of those two years may, the Managing Editor advises, be used, off and on, during the

winter months, and will be renewed next summer if there is a demand for them.

The Courier is grateful to Mr. William Carey for placing at its disposal the scrap book which was begun by the very competent Secretary-Treasurer of the Catholic League in 1932. With Mr. Carey's permission we will care further for the book inasmuch as we want more of its stuff for later use.

George Hawkin, through one single visit, aided materially in "putting the League back into print again." He recounted items of interest that only the men connected with the League in those days could give. Bill Marks, with Hawkin, one of the organizers of the circuit and, incidentally its first temporary President, and Jimmy Heveron, "school-boy star" of the loop way back, assisted in various ways to straighten out details ambiguous.

It's been pleasant for Insider to review these games. He never gets tired of perusing Carey's Scrap Book. It recalls his elementary school days when he used to run from the Immaculate Conception clear to South Park—without stopping for fear of being late—to watch those games.

We hope the M. E. keeps his word and permits us to go back to these games, and the League, ere long.

Rochester fans will have the opportunity of seeing a game next week when the University of Rochester raises the curtain with an inter-sectional foe, Oberlin College. "Uncle Tom" Davies isn't expecting too much of the Yellowjackets this early.

Inter-scholastic interest will center in the Aquinas Institute team, coached by Johnnie Sullivan. Semi-pro games will be plentiful with the Oxfords and Russers entered in a league which may or may not be what the fans want. The Arpekos, headed by Gregg Swarthout, former Dartmouth end, is a new outfit, but said to be made up of many Russur favorites. Packey McFarland and Billy Mandell will manage the Russers again, while Fred Fogarty begins his tenth season as director of the Oxfords.
