St. Francis Church In Auburn To Celebrate Silver Jubilee

Auburn—In observance of the 25th anniversary of the founding of St. Francis Church in lower Clark Street, an impressive celebration will be carried out for one week early in October. The church was dedicated in 1908 and has grown during the quarter century to a parish of 900 families and a membership of more than 4,000.

A meeting of Italian citizens was held in 1905 at St. Mary's Church rectory by the pastor, Rev. William Mulheron, for the purpose of forming a church for the Italian people of Auburn. The following committee was appointed to start the project: Joseph Ray, president; John Iacovino, treasurer; Rev. G. R. Fitzsimmons and Alfonso Di Christoforo, trustees. The committee solicited funds sufficient to buy two lots at 180-192 Clark Street, where the present church and rectory now stand.

In the following year, 1906, a corporation was formed known as St. Francis Assisi Roman Catholic Church of Auburn. The officers elected were: Rev. G. R. Fitzsimmons, pastor; Michael Giannino and Alfonso Di Christoforo, trustees. Rev. John Robotti was appointed pastor in April, 1907. The cornerstone of the church was blessed by Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Hickey, Bishop of the diocese of Rochester, on July 26, 1908. Later a parochial school of

ST. JOSEPH'S HOSPITAL IN ELMIRA CELEBRATES 25TH YEAR OF SERVICE

By CAROLYN RUTH DORAN Elmira—With simplicity and with concentration on the spiritual values of their foundation, St. Joseph's Hospital staff here on Sunday commemorated in religious service only the important event of the completion of twenty-five years of existence.

St. Joseph's Hospital was founded in 1908 by the late Dr. Daniel P. Murphy and his associates, the late Rt. Rev. Bernard J. McQuill, first Bishop of Rochester and seven Sisters of St. Joseph.

In the Dunn Memorial Chapel, the Rev. George Eisler, Chaplain, celebrated his Mass as usual at 9 a. m., offering it as a Mass of special thanksgiving for the work accomplished. The Sisters of the hospital staff and the nurses of the training school were in attendance, all offering their Sunday reception of the Sacrament of the Eucharist also in commemoration of the event.

In the hospital chapel, the Rev. Thomas Toole offered another Mass of thanksgiving at 7:30 a. m. Both priests spoke at the respective ceremonies, noting the significance of this new milestone in the history of the institution.

In commenting on the extraordinary growth of the hospital, Father Toole compared its modest beginning to the planting of the mustard seed. Tracing the allusion of the gospel parable throughout the history of the institution's development, he emphasized that the remarkable physical growth, however, was not the most important element. Emphasizing the fact that the large physical plant was the outward manifestation of growth, he showed how the primary objective of a Catholic hospital is spiritual, not material, and that its service is intended first of all with bringing peace to human souls. Picturing the work in such an institution, therefore, as a work of love rather than one guided by purely scientific objectives, he reiterated the importance of having to preserve always the same characteristic of courage as characterized the few women who began the work for love of Christ when material means were few and difficult of attainment.

All during the day, Sisters and nurses again remembered the anniversary in special prayer in visits to the Blessed Sacrament, the rite of Exposition being in order Sunday as a regular spiritual exercise at the Convent Chapel in the Dunn Memorial Building.

At 7:30 o'clock the Rt. Rev. John J. Lee, V. L., officiated at Solemn Benediction, assisted by Fathers

Auburn—A sum of approximately \$600 more was collected on some of the 5,000 unpaid Mercy Hospital pledges according to the report turned over to Chairman William D. 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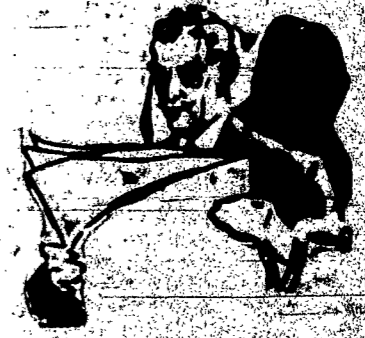
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
