**MISSION SUNDAY THOUGHTS**

In his Mission Sunday message for 1933, Archbishop Salotti, Secretary of the S. Congregation of Propaganda, dwells on considerations prompting a fervent observance of the day. After touching upon the Christian aspect of Missions, His Excellency states in his message:

"From the human view-point, Mission Sunday is a solemn affirmation of the true and loyal solidarity of all men. Every effort to destroy our consciousness of the common origin of man or the part of scientists or commercial speculators, who, for motives altogether too interested and egotistic, wish to justify slavery, forced labor, and the exploitation of the weak and ignorant, has found sharp opposition from the Church. Catholic missions are the most dignified and eloquent reply to these contradictions of universal brotherhood. The missions represent an enormous investment of material riches and of spiritual and moral energy, dedicated to the most distant and most needy of men; they are the bearers of the sweetest and most elevated of messages ever heard upon the earth.

"On Mission Sunday we reaffirm in a practical way these principles of human goodness, we resolve once again to spread light in darkness, to comfort the suffering, to open to hearts bright ardent hopes, to rekindle the flame of a love world wide and pure, destined to perpetuate itself in God, Father of all mankind.

"ALL BELIEVERS FOR ALL UNBELIEVERS—this is the great goal of Mission Sunday. Mobilize all to this happy end—this is the commission which I confide to the paternal solicitude of the Bishops, to the earnest zeal of the clergy, religious and secular, to the generosity of the laity, in order that all may give themselves devotedly to the success of the day. May the great feast bring sweet comfort to valiant pioneers who struggle in distant lands, in the first line trenches, in silent sacrifice for the undying triumph of Christ the King.

**PUTTING GOD IN THE WILL**

More than \$275,000 will be distributed to eighteen Catholic institutions under the will of Rose C. Newman, a New York City woman who remembered "to put God in her will."

ing her holy mission she has grave needs. And everywhere the forces of evil are working ceaselessly to restrict her in the fulfillment of her divine mission of saving souls. An example in our day is the moving picture, with its incalculable influence for evil. What a manager of the innocence of youth is taking place hour by hour! How shall the crimes that have their direct source in immoral motion pictures be measured? Catholics are called by God, the Pope, the Bishops and the priests, to a united and vigorous campaign for the purification of the cinema, which has become a deadly menace to morals. And this is but one of many evil forces working against the Lord and against His Christ forces with which Catholic Action must wage relentless warfare.

"Catholics of America must show their zeal for every good work, for every holy crusade, sanctifying others by their example. In his individual life, and in the life of the family, by his observance of the sanctity of the marriage state, by his zeal for the education of youth and by his generous cooperation in every movement to which he is called by his spiritual leaders, the true Catholic will respond to the invitation of Pope Pius XI and thus render an inestimable contribution to the Church and to the nation. He will answer wholeheartedly the call of Catholic Action!"

The principal address by a layman was that of former Governor Alfred E. Smith, who spoke on "Leadership for Social Welfare."

**Need of Appropriations**

Only by the liberality of its appropriations for making its efforts by law effective can the State do its proper share in promoting social justice, Governor Smith said, adding: "There is no use enacting laws promoting social justice unless you appropriate enough money to make them effective."

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. Robert F. Keenan, President of the Conference, expressed the belief that the depression was ending but reminded his audience that 3,500,000 families in the United States were still on the relief rolls and that relief work was more essential than ever.

The Very Rev. Dr. William J. Kirby, of the Catholic University of America, Washington, D. C., told of the life and aims of Frederick Ozanam, founder of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, which is holding its centenary in connection with the meeting.

Addresses of welcome on behalf of the State and the city were delivered by Lieutenant-Governor Bly and Mayor O'Brien. George J. Gillespie, president of the superior council of the Society of St. Vincent de Paul, presided, and the invocation was delivered by the Most Rev. James Hugh Ryan, Rector of the Catholic University of America. Cardinal Hayes gave the Benediction.

The conference was formally opened with a solemn Pontifical High Mass in St. Patrick's Cathedral, yesterday morning. Thirty-five members of the Hierarchy were in the sanctuary. Archbishop Ciesinski, who was present as the personal representative of the Pope, and Cardinal Hayes occupied thrones. The sermon was delivered by the Most Rev. Michael J. Curley, Archbishop of Baltimore.

Proceeding the Mass, a procession in four sections, was held. The first came from Cathedral College, the second from the rectory of the Cathedral, the third, in which the members of the Hierarchy participated, from the residence of Cardinal Hayes, and the fourth escorted the Papal Delegate and Cardinal Hayes.

Recording the Activities of Rochester Parish Sodality Union

News comes to us from Holy Redeemer Sodality. Members of the Publicity Committee are working on the first issue of the Sodality paper.

Rev. Robert Fox, Director of the Rochester Parish Sodality Union spoke at the first meeting of the Holy Ghost Parish Sodality. He related his experiences at the recent School of Catholic Action and outlined the ideal sodality formation. He concluded with a short spiritual talk. Refreshments were served.

Holy Ghost Sodality is forming the devotion of the Living Rosary as the sodality activity for October. A membership drive is also included in the Sodality plans and with the two teams working as they are, rounding up their friends and companions, it promises to be successful.

St. Peter and Paul Sodality is planning for its Communion Breakfast to be held on October 16.

The Sodality are interested in starting a Sodality bowling team. With bowling teams, tennis clubs, chess clubs, dramatic associations, orchestras and what not the sodality is certainly touching every phase of interest and enjoyment.

**Requests Prayers**

In preparation for the coming of the new Shepherd of the flock a request is going forth from the Rt. Rev. Msgr. William M. Hart through the pastors to the laity that prayers and Holy Communions on Sunday, October 8, be offered for God's blessing on Archbishop Mooney as he begins the work of his episcopate.

It has been suggested to the pastors that to the prayers after each Mass be added five Our Fathers, and five Hail Marys for the spiritual and temporal welfare of our new leader.

In his request letter Monsignor Hart states:

"Only a small percentage of the two hundred thousand members of the diocese will be able to assist at the solemn service of installation at the Cathedral and the great majority will be unable to attend the public reception at Columbus Auditorium on October 12 at 8:15 p. m. to which all are invited. It is felt that this offering of prayers and Holy Communions will enable all our people to know that they have a personal share in the happy welcome with which the diocese greets Archbishop Mooney on his coming."

The school children will also have a part in offering prayers for the new Bishop. A suggestion has been sent out by the Rev. John M. Duffy, Director of Catholic Education that the school children form a spiritual bouquet for Archbishop Mooney to consist of Masses, Holy Communions, Spiritual Communions, Rosaries, Litanies, Stations of the Cross and Aspirations.

The day following the installation, Friday, October 13, is the feast of St. Edward and the day will be a holiday in all schools of the diocese in honor of the new Bishop of Rochester.

Cleveland—At the banquet tendered the Most Rev. Charles H. 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tion in the National Industrial Recovery Act, and that a sustained and honest effort will be made to impose the rates which have been established. Some of us who have, for more than a quarter of a century, advocated minimum wage legislation, are not yet fully recovered from the pleasant shock of finding this dream come true. Our hats are still off to the genuinely great man who has translated the dream into reality Franklin D. Roosevelt!"

Happily, Msgr. Ryan said, the great ethical principle of full liberty of workers to organize is explicitly and adequately embodied in the National Industrial Recovery Act. "This," he said, "is a gain which is second only to that implied in the minimum wage provisions of the statute. Happily, too, this legislative sanction is receiving full protection at the hands of the National Recovery Administration. It is true that we have witnessed some reprehensible attempts to nullify these provisions of the Act by reservations, interpretations and other dishonest devices. Nevertheless, we should try to exercise charity and tolerance toward those heads of great corporations who have descended to this injustice and trickery. We should bear in mind that their minds and hearts have been corrupted by a long tradition of immoral business practices, unlimited economic domination, unjust legislative favoritism and ethically unsound decisions by the courts."

**Lower Returns to Capital**

"The underlying theory of the National Industrial Recovery Act," Msgr. Ryan said, "is that the purchasing power of labor must be increased in order that the industrial product may be sold, the industrial machine kept going and unemployment ended. Increased purchasing power for labor means higher wages and a larger share of the national product. If the share of labor is increased, the share of capital must be decreased. This is a mathematical certainty. Moreover, the increase in the volume of wages which is necessary to attain the ends of the 'Na-
