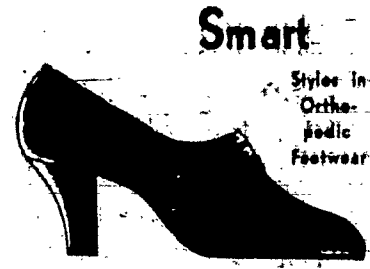
Father Lally brought out many historical facts while portraying the hardships of the life in the American wilds and the torture from the Indians endured by the eight North American martyrs.
