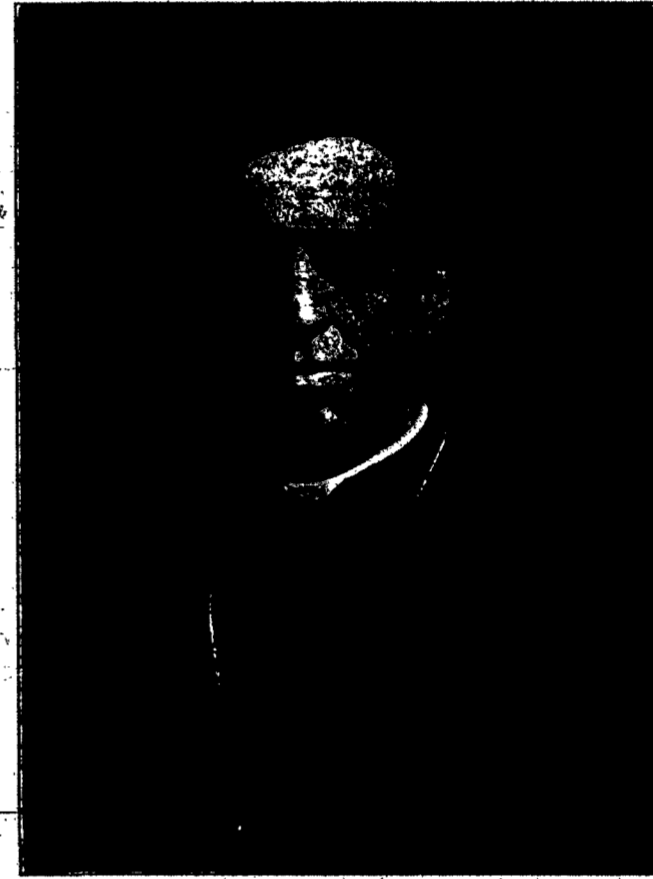
FOURTH BISHOP OF ROCHESTER



Most Reverend Edward Mooney, D.D.

HIS EXCELLENCY, the Most Reverend Edward Mooney, D. D., who now occupies the throne in St. Patrick's Cathedral as the fourth Bishop of the See of Rochester. Prior to his appointment by His Holiness, Pope Pius XI, as Bishop-designate of Rochester, Archbishop Mooney was Apostolic Delegate to Japan. As Bishop of Rochester, he retains his title of Archbishop "ad personam." Born in Maryland, His Excellency, Archbishop Mooney, claims Youngstown, Ohio, as his home city. He has had a distinguished career since his ordination on April 10, 1909, in Rome, where he completed his theology at the North American College with high honors. He has served as pastor, teacher, spiritual director and became the first American-born priest to receive a permanent appointment to the diplomatic service of the Holy See. Before going to Japan, Archbishop Mooney served as Apostolic Delegate to India. The See of Rochester is honored with another illustrious prelate as "Shepherd of the Flock."

SECOND BISHOP OF ROCHESTER



Most Reverend Thomas F. Hickey, D.D.

His Excellency, the Most Reverend Thomas F. Hickey, D. D., titular Archbishop of Viminacium and second Ordinary of the See of Rochester. Successor of the illustrious Bishop McQuaid, Archbishop Hickey had a distinguished reign as Bishop of Rochester from January 18, 1909, until his retirement in 1929.
