ARCHBISHOP MOONEY COAT OF ARMS LINKED WITH ROCHESTER DIOCESE

The new coat of arms of Archbishop Edward Mooney has incorporated in its design the coat of arms of the Rochester Diocese.

The designs were drawn by Pierre Chaignon de La Rose of Cambridge, Mass., craftsman and student of heraldry. That of the diocese depicts a red cross of St. Andrew on a silver shield and suggests that of Rochester, England.

That of the English city has in the center a shell indicative of sea-going interests, whereas that designed by Mr. de La Rose, of this diocese has a crescent, the insignia of the Immaculate Conception, the titular patroness of the United States. Surrounding the shield is the mitre.

The diocesan coat of arms is inscribed on the left side of Archbishop Mooney's new insignia. On the right-hand side is the holly tree of the Mooney family and a conventional rose, used by the old Roman family of the Orsini in their heraldic banner.

Above the shield is the cross, with two bars to denote the archbishop's rank and the prelatial hat in green. The crozier represented at the side is indicative of the episcopal rank. Ten tassels are suspended from the hat on either side. A bishop usually has six tassels in his coat of arms; an archbishop ten.

The motto of the new bishop, "Domino Servientes" is engraved on the insular. This translated "Serving the Lord," is taken from the 12th chapter of St. Paul's Epistles, the lesson in the breviary on the day on which Archbishop Mooney was appointed to the Rochester episcopacy.

In addition to spiritual duties it involves important administrative functions and decisions in Rochester and other communities of the diocese. These responsibilities have grown with the years as the church membership has expanded.

The people of Rochester, without distinction of creed or belief, join in extending a most cordial welcome to the new bishop.

By virtue of his office he assumes at once an important position in the community, with ties that will doubtless strengthen continually as his personality becomes more widely known.

Archbishop Edward Mooney, installed today by Patrick Cardinal Hayes as fourth Roman Catholic bishop of Rochester at a brilliant ceremony, is greeted and welcomed by ceremony and before a distinguished all.
Fervent hopes for the success of his administration—friendly wishes for the new spiritual leader—are extended heartily. They come from distant places as from members of all denominations here.
Catholics give their loyal allegiance. Perhaps no more striking illustration of the unquestioned authority and unit of the Catholic Church could be given than the one which is today being shown in the installation of the bishop.
A stranger to the laity here, little known among members of the clergy of this diocese, this distinguished churchman is sent from Japan to Rochester. He obeys like a soldier of the cross that he is.
He is accepted loyally, devotedly. Archbishop Mooney comes to no frontier diocese in becoming Bishop of Rochester. It is 277 years since a Jesuit priest raised the cross in this vicinity.
The Rev. Patrick McCormick, the first priest to celebrate mass in Rochester at an established church, came 115 years ago. The diocese itself came into existence sixty-five years ago.
The Rochester Journal joins with others of the diocese in greeting the new leader whose whole career has been a preparation for the responsibilities he accepts today.
