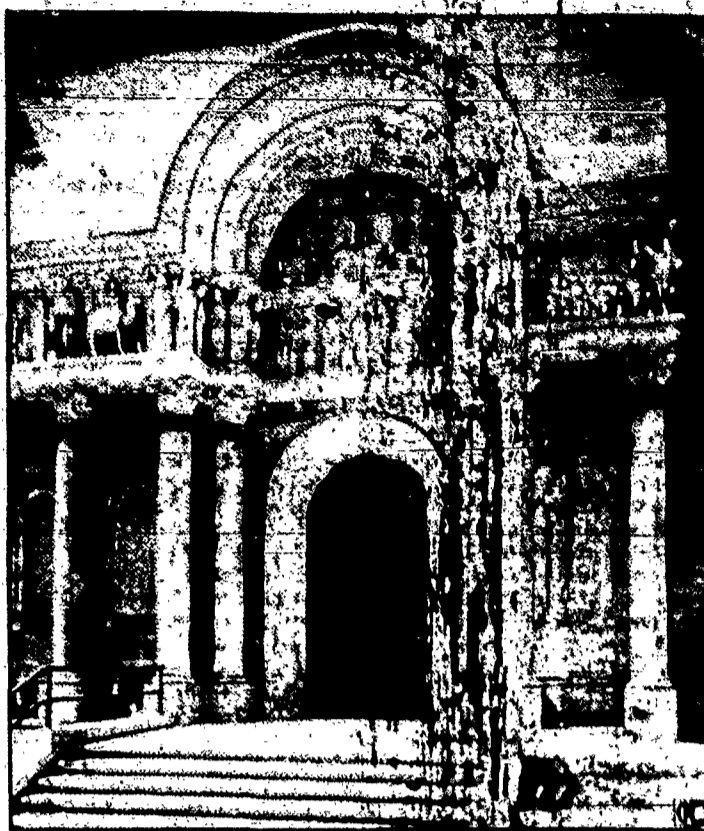

Any coach who tells a boy to foul another man to get him out of the game, is not worthy to be a cattle driver. To deliberately break a person's leg is a serious sin and the one breaking it must pay the doctor bills and other expenses. CHARITY WORK IN AUSTRIA SEEN AS MODEL

Vienna.—The Austrian Catholic system of charity, operating as the Austrian Caritas League, was emphasized as a model of organized charitable work in a report given at the meeting of the Board of Directors of Caritas Catolica, international union of Catholic charity organizations throughout Europe.

The meeting, which was held at Basel, Switzerland, was told that the structure of Catholic charity work in this country follows closely the organization plan of the Catholic Church.

The report was made in connection with another report detailing endeavors now being made to found national groups of Caritas Catolica throughout Europe, which, while affiliated with the international group, retain their own autonomy in the administration and conduct of their respective charitable institutions and undertakings without external interference from the international group or common Board of Directors. This general idea is somewhat embodied in the present plan, but, it was pointed out, the organization has been but loosely held together.

It was explained in the description of the Austrian Catholic charity system that every diocese of this country has its own special association to which are affiliated all the Catholic institutions of charity and social welfare. This association is responsible to the Ordinary of the See. The diocesan organization, in turn, is a unit in the Caritas League, the decisions and actions of which become operative in all dioceses provided that they are approved by the hierarchy of the country at large.
