Catholic Evidence Library Opens In Center, Nov. 6th

Announcement is made today by the Rev. Benedict A. Ehmman that the Catholic Evidence Library, located on the lobby of the Columbus Civic Center, will be opened for public use on Monday evening, November 6. Details of its policy and subscription requirements will be made public in next week's issue of the CATHOLIC COURIER.

With the approval of the Rev. Francis P. LeBuffe, S.J., one of the directors of the National Catholic Evidence Conference, the new library will be called the Catholic Evidence Library, because all its books will have some bearing, direct or indirect on the Catholic way of life and thought, Father Ehmman said. This purpose, however, will include more than technical works; for the library will secure as rapidly as possible a wide selection of the best Catholic fiction, poetry, history and biography. Secular books, especially novels, which are approved by Catholic critics, will be added as soon as income permits.

It is also intended that the Library shall serve as an information bureau for all inquirers on questions of Catholic faith and practice. This will be a service of special benefit to non-Catholics and to converts, though many Catholics may also be expected to take advantage of such an easily reached opportunity. For this purpose, a priest will be in attendance in the Library. It is hoped that this service will develop into a very vital part of Rochester's religious life.
