MARY'S HELP SAVES A LIFE

In a certain hospital a young mother lay dying. The earth and its beauties were fading from her eyes. The memories of cherished years of love and hopes were passing from her mind. Her life was ebbing. New glories were creeping into her misty vision and another world was calling. The babe just born was becoming motherless, for the dying woman had just joined with God in one of the grandest, sublimest acts of His Almighty Will. The young husband was there, piece of good advice the author tells through the crystal of his tears, weighing out the values of life. He was considering the cost. Was God really the strict Bargainer that this event caused Him to appear? Why, in this instance, was God demanding one life as the price of another? There must be a reason; but why, why must this one life be torn from his heart in order that the babe be planted there? His wife and all that she means to him her love, her help, her sustaining hand, why must he yield these in order that the tiny life she brought into the world might grow and flourish in his heart? That darling infant with only its possibilities of love and help and tenderness surely should not crush out the one love that he drew to his heart in an eternal embrace.

Let Us Kneel Into those sacred musings intruded the shattering whippers of his earthly kin. "She has not left you yet!" he told him. "Remember, hope leaves only when life has left. There is one we know that will help us in this shadowy hour. Let us kneel at Her Feet and pray. Let us plead with Her and implore this help." So they went to the Shrine where the sorrows of generations have melted away. Quietly, hopefully, those sad hearts looked up at Our Mother of Perpetual Help and told Her the story of a young mother's plight. Perseverently they prayed. Confusedly they told Her the desires they hoped for; told Her how profoundly they entrusted in Her prayer to the Son of God of Heaven. Her Child. They did not forget to tell Her what the Doctors had said—their heart-rending final verdict. No hope. Her recovery was impossible. They had done all that finite skill and practised effort could do. They had used all the feeble means of human science, yet that young and tender life was slipping steadily and silently through all the barriers that surgery and medicine could supply. "Honor the physician for the need thou hast of him," says Ecclesiasticus, "for the most High hath created him. For all healing is from God." SODAL TALK

Recording the Activities of Rochester Parish Sodality Union

Be sure and keep Monday evening, November 6, free. It is Union meeting night at the Columbus Civic Center at 8 o'clock. It promises to be a good meeting, so don't miss it.

Excerpts from the resolutions drawn up at the Parish Sodality Convention show both the extent of Sodality work and the powerful influence it can exert.

To anyone unacquainted with the Sodality and its aims the following is a complete and clear definition: "Whereas Primarily the Sodality of Our Lady provides means for growth in personal holiness and an opportunity for service to fellow members, the parish, and the community; by which, under the direction of the pastor and the demands of local needs, the corporal works of mercy may be carried on; growth in Christian ideals fostered, recreation and community needs provided for, and other activities included in the Holy Father's definition of Catholic Action promoted; be it—

Resolved: That we bend our energies to sanctify ourselves by the consecration of ever the best of our activities to the heart of Sodality, the Blessed Sacrament, and more generously devote our individual talents to mutual upbuilding in virtue and ideals, to some one or more of the concrete labors which are for Church and country, all for God, such as the missions, propagation of the faith, catechetics, care of the sick and needy, aiding in education, providing for club and social activities in the parish, developing and using our talents for the general good to the end that parish life may flourish, and striving always to be exemplars of the Master.

The interest in Catholic Evidence Guilds which is spreading through the country and the existence of study clubs and Catholic literature committees resulted in this resolution:

Resolved: That we as Sodality pledge ourselves to study our faith by reading good Catholic literature, books, pamphlets and papers; that we form study clubs to further equip ourselves mentally and spiritually to see the reasonableness of our faith and to combat the prevailing heresies, and further more, be it—

Resolved: That we bend every effort to defend the Church and spread the faith by distributing Catholic literature particularly through wise use of pamphlet racks in our churches, reading the pamphlets ourselves and urging others to do so. Apropos of this very point, a Catholic Evidence Library is being prepared at the Columbus Civic Center. The Rev. Benedict Ekmann is scheduled to speak on this at the Sodality Union Meeting.

The announcement of the Theatre Guild begun in this city under the direction of the Rev. John Randall, of which some of the Rochester Sodality may become members recalls this Resolution: That Sodality promote the betterment of motion pictures, 1) by carefully watching all pictures and vigorously protesting to theatre owners when pictures are contrary to Catholic standards and morals, these protests to be individually signed; 2) by commending all good pictures and urging Catholic attendance at these pictures; 3) by refraining from attending pictures of lower moral standards and endorsing and attending only those films that are of a moral, cultural and educational tone.
