Catholic Evidence Library Staff And Rules Announced For Opening

Rochester's new Catholic Evidence Library will be opened to the public next Monday evening, November 6 at 7 o'clock. Location will be in Columbus Civic Center library on the right hand side of the main lobby immediately near the Chestnut Street entrance.

The new library will be in charge of the Rev. Benedict Ehmann and will be staffed by the following volunteer librarians: Miss Monica Quinn, librarian-in-charge, and her assistants, Miss Marcella Reichenberger, Miss Helen Coyne, Miss Rosemary Schiffrin, Miss Mary Moran and Miss Elsie Waterhouse.

1. It will be open each Monday, Wednesday and Friday from 3:30 to 5:30 p. m. and from 7 to 9:30 p. m. and each Sunday afternoon from 3:30 to 5:30.

2. Each book will be rented at two cents a day and may be kept for two weeks. The privilege of renewing the subscription for another two weeks will be granted for all books not in urgent demand.

3. All young people below 18 years of age will not be eligible to the privileges of the library. An arrangement will, however, be made whereby the members of Catholic literature study groups in the high schools may, on presentation of a recommendation signed by the teacher in charge of the study group, draw specified books subject to the regular library rules.

4. Visiting the library entails no obligation to rent a book. The library quarters, though not spacious, are nevertheless sufficiently roomy to be used as a reading room, where restful quiet may be assured in the comfortable chairs and divans. Besides the books of circulation, the library will have on its reference shelves the Catholic Encyclopedia and the Catholic Dictionary, which will furnish a veritable treasure-house of information on Catholic names and things.

He commended their contribution to the development of the parochial school system and took occasion to pay tribute to all Catholic teaching Sisterhoods for unselfish, zealous devotion to the secular and religious training of Catholic children.
