The first Thanksgiving Day college football game in several years in Rochester will this year bring together on Thursday afternoon, November 30, beginning at 1:45 o'clock in Red Wing Stadium, two Catholic college teams, Notre Dame B and St. Bonaventure's Brown-Indians, for the benefit of the Nazareth College Building Fund.

All the color that goes with a Thanksgiving Day college football game will be lent to the occasion according to the plans now in the making. Bands, cheerleaders, and pen-nants will be present to stimulate the two teams. Alumni of Notre Dame and St. Bonaventure will attend to cheer their respective teams to victory.

Imperfections of Apologetics Cited By Frank J. Sheed

"Apologetics, as preached today, in a vacuum, is over-simplified, too defensive and too logical" said Frank J. Sheed, noted English Catholic Evidence Worker and publisher, in a lecture before teachers in the Catholic schools of Rochester at Nazareth Academy last week.

"The purpose of apologetics is twofold. To establish the truths which the Church teaches and to win people outside the Church to accept those truths and at the same time prevent people inside the Church from discarding them," stated Mr. Sheed.

Mr. Sheed said "the fault of all apologetics is that it is not related to anything actually present," and he added, "dead apologetics proves the existence of enormous virtues and has no belief in the virtues themselves."

"Do not answer a question by a direct answer," warned Mr. Sheed. "It is your duty to explain what the doctrine of the Church means, before you begin to prove it. If they understand the doctrine, then they will be convinced, whereas your proof would leave them unconvinced." "Truth will get results and bring thousands to the faith where argument fails," therefore Mr. Sheed urged his audience to treat Catholic doctrine as part of an organism, a living whole, and teach it in a vivifying and vital manner.

Do not be timorous in presenting the Catholic religion, said Mr. Sheed, but "build up the notion of the magnificence of mystery, for the infinitude of truth is the only guarantee of the mind against eternal stagnation."

"The only answer to anything is everything," Mr. Sheed declared, and the doctrine of the supernatural life is the key to the totality of Catholic doctrine. "The whole trouble is that with the reformation, the principle thing lost was the supernatural life and people have gone on talking about Hell and Heaven in that manner and without any theological knowledge of the next life. Heaven, to them, was a place where you were happy and Hell a place where you were unhappy. The solution of this whole state of mind is the doctrine of supernatural life."

"No Catholic ever lapsed from the Church if he understood the doctrine of Supernatural Life; they may be tempted but they will never drift away," concluded Mr. Sheed.
