Blessed Jean Antida Thouret, foundress of the Congregation of the Sisters of Charity of Resurrection and of Naples, whose canonization approaches its final stages. Blessed Jean lived from 1769 to 1826 and during the French Revolution gave inspiring examples of charity and unwavering loyalty to Christian teaching, even in the face of threats of death. She was beatified on May 28, 1920.

Jesuit-Indian Contacts Described on New Map An unusual and graphic picture map of the Seneca villages and Jesuit and French contacts with the Indians in this section of New York State prepared under the direction of the Rev. Mr. Alexander M. Stewart, is procurable at the offices of the Catholic Courier, Columbus Civic Center, 50 Chestnut Street.

This map is the only thing available outside of libraries giving in brief form the story of the French and Jesuit visits and labors here three hundred years ago. With the map goes a booklet containing a list of references which may be had in Rochester libraries and by which the subject may become fully known.

The map has become accepted as a genuine piece of historic work and has been placed in various university libraries throughout the country including Harvard, Loyola of Chicago and many others.
