Twenty-one years ago De Sales High School, Geneva, opened its doors to the Catholic children of Geneva and vicinity. Today 312 pupils are enrolled in the school, and of that number, 50 are registered in the commercial course, the remainder in academic work; the faculty numbers 12. Besides the usual commercial subjects De Sales High School lists the following academic subjects in its curricula: English, Latin, Mathematics, Social Studies, Sciences, Foreign Languages and Art.

De Sales High School deserves high praise for the splendid work it is doing but at the same time attention should be called to the major contributing factor to this success—the Catholics of Geneva. For the cost of maintaining this high school for the past year which exceeded \$10,000.00 was defrayed by receipts of equal amount received from two Catholic parishes in Geneva. These parishes of ordinary means are contributing to the education of approximately 165 boys and girls apiece in spite of the present economic condition. That is Catholic Action! It is an example of what can be done by Catholic men and women if there is sufficient interest and cooperation.

This, of course, has been made possible through the zealous and sympathetic leadership of the two Geneva pastors, the Rt. Rev. Mgr. Walter J. Lee, V. F., and the Rev. William H. Madden. There has been constant interest and enthusiasm in this institution which is due mainly to the kindly and intelligent direction of the Rev. Edward K. Ball, who has won the goodwill of teachers, students and parents as the principal of De Sales High School.

 with detailed discussion and mutual guarantees to follow.

"All that law remains to achieve normal diplomatic relations is the honest and unequivocal fulfillment of Moscow's public pledges, publicly given. That goal is yet to come. The future lies wholly and solely in the keeping of the Soviet Government, which undertakes in clear and understandable language to do certain things of considerable importance.

"Mr. Litvinoff's government, in paragraph four of his letter on propaganda and non-interference, undertakes specifically:

"Not to permit the formation or residence on its territory of any organization or group—and to prevent the activity on its territory of any organization or group, or of any representatives or officials of any organization or group—which has as its aim the overthrow of, or bringing about by force of a change in, the political or social order of the whole or any part of the United States, its territories or possessions.

"Evidently the signatories of last Friday's pact are prepared to get down to cases after sixteen years of hypothetical and sterile mutual recriminations.

**Hostile Organization**  
 "There is at present in residence on Soviet territory, housed in a government building not far from the Kremlin, an organization, highly developed, with international ramifications and notoriously hostile to this country.

"It has the avowed aim of changing the social and political order which is established by law and the free choice of American citizens in these United States. It has been in continued existence for some fourteen years.

"In execution of its purpose, it has a special American section devoted to preparing the overthrow by force of fundamental American institutions guaranteed by Article Four, Section Four, of the Constitution of the United States.

"Stenographic reports of its deliberations are available, and its specific program with regard to the United States is a matter of public record.

"Mr. Stalin is a member of its executive committee, and on May 6, 1929, delivered definite and voluminous instructions to a so-called American commission with respect to the methods of achieving the changes in our social and political institutions mentioned by Mr. Litvinoff. The authentic text of Mr. Stalin's remarks on that occasion are on file in the State Department.

**End of Third International**  
 "The Soviet Government, through its Commissioner for Foreign Affairs, now pledges itself to terminate the residence of all such organizations on Soviet territory. This is not one of the secondary problems postponed, by agreement of President Roosevelt, for later consideration, but is a primary guarantee immediately operative.

"The political success or failure of the new agreement, in my opinion, rests fairly and squarely on the shoulders of the Soviet Government, which is now under solemn covenant, openly and voluntarily arrived at, to end the Third International. Delay or further evasion can result in only one logical conclusion:

"There is no return to, normal diplomatic relations so long as one of the parties to the contract retains, fosters, and protects on its territory a hostile and intransigent organization, which is bound by its constitution and statutes to do the very things so clearly outlawed by Mr. Litvinoff in the fourth point of his pledge."

 Ithaca.—The Rev. J. M. Duffy of Rochester was the principal speaker at the first annual communion breakfast of the Nocturnal Adoration Society of the Church of the Immaculate Conception Sunday morning, Nov. 19, at the Victoria Hotel.

Fifty members and their guests attended the affair, marking the first anniversary of the organization of the society. The Rev. George Fischer, spiritual director, gave a short outline of the work and intention of the organization.

Auburn.—Very Rev. Dean John A. Conway, pastor of Holy Family Church, gave an inspiring address on "The Aims and Benefits of the N. C. C. W." at the November meeting of the Auburn Deanery Units held in the home of Court Auburn, Catholic Daughters of America.

Miss Irene Cooper, newly elected president, presided at the meeting, with Mrs. A. M. Stevens, secretary. As delegate and vice-president, Mrs. Steigerwald reviewed the convention of the Council held in October in Rochester. The message from Miss Anne Sarachon Hooley of Washington, D. **Dr. Kettell Asks Co-operation For Legion's Program**

"In America today occupying chairs in certain colleges and high schools are men and women actually teaching treasonable doctrines to the children at their feet," the Rev. Dr. George F. Kettell, pastor of St. Patrick's Church, Macedon, and former national chaplain of the American Legion declared in a Veterans Night address before Rochester Council, Knights of Columbus, last Thursday evening in Columbus Civic Centre.

These misguided instructors of American youth, the speaker said, were teaching that no American citizen has got to bear arms in the event of an emergency such as war and may feel free in conscience in thus declining. This and other poisonous doctrines are being instilled into the plastic minds of children, he said, and the American Legion has gone on record to go out and fight this undercover enemy working against the nation.

Dr. Kettell declared that those who have seen the horrors of war are not putting themselves out to bring about another such catastrophe, neither are they blinding themselves to the possibilities of war coming to a nation too weak to defend itself.

The Legion, he said, has already taken steps to furnish an antidote for the destructive propaganda being spread throughout the country and he cited cases showing how the antidote is being administered with good results.

From those outside the Legion he asked a complete understanding of the aims of the veterans organization and a spirit of cooperation be shown in reaching these aims. He explained the Legion's determination to have men suffering from the effects of war treated properly and outlined the universal service law taking the profit out of war and making everyone give patriotic service with a minimum of financial return.

Dr. Kettell was introduced by Chairman Frank Toomey of the Veterans Night Committee, Grand Knight, Dr. Walter B. O'Neill followed the conclusion of Dr. Kettell's address.
