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NEW N. Y.-PENN. CATHOLIC HIGH BASKETBALL LOOP TO SHOW FIVES REPRESENTING ELMIRA AND AUBURN

Two Catholic high schools of Rochester Diocese are to be represented in the newly organized New York-Pennsylvania Catholic High School League, the Elmira Catholic High School and the Holy Family High School of Auburn. Elmira Catholic High will inaugurate play in the new league on December 10 with St. Patrick's of Binghamton at Elmira and Holy Family team will meet St. Mary's School of Cortland on the same date at Auburn. Elmira's representatives in the league are launching the second basketball season with a promising outlook. Heartened by the splendid record of 17 wins out of 23 starts last year, the boys, under the direction of Coach Ray Gavigan are addressing themselves to the pre-season practice work with unbounded enthusiasm.

Big Squad Turns Out When Coach Joseph Curtin and his assistant Charles Wise issued first call for candidates for Holy Family High of Auburn, 48 of the 76 boys in the school answered. The squad has been trimmed to a squad of 22. Rev. William E. Davis, principal of the school, and Coach Curtin announced last week that the team would represent Auburn in the new league. Binghamton and Cortland in the Syracuse diocese and Susquehanna, in the Scranton diocese are also represented by teams.

The indomitable spirit of Coach Ray Gavigan has been caught by the Elmira Catholic High Five and his team is recognized as a formidable and colorful aggregation.

Gavigan War Veteran During the World War, Gavigan served in France with the U. S. Marines. Injuries in service resulted in the amputation of Gavigan's left leg. This, however, failed to dull the youthful "leatherneck's" keenness for sports and when Elmira Catholic High's court team started last year, Gavigan was their "buddy-coach."

Under his tutelage the team won six successive victories, the sixth being the 23 to 9 rout over the National Catholic Tournament contenders of 1932, St. Patrick's of Binghamton.

Serious trouble developing in Gavigan's right leg necessitated a second amputation and with the season successfully started, the team again lost its coach. The infectious good nature of the man, the sporting spirit he possesses, was passed on to the boys giving them added courage throughout the season. A brilliant record earned them an invitation to the Y. M. C. A. tournament held at Elmira at the close of the season and they were noosed out by one lone basket in the semi-finals.

Lone Valued Player Discharged from the U. S. Marine hospital early in the spring, Gavigan in a wheel chair came back to his charges and laid plays for the 1933-1934 season. Before his inventory of the stock-in-trade was completed came the saddest blow of all. Myron Supple, gentleman, scholar and athlete, one of Ray's "boys," stricken with pneumonia, died. The coach and team mourned deeply their loss for young Supple had been an important factor in the team's success.

Gavigan hasn't announced a definite line-up but it is believed that with a few exceptions, last year's regulars will be used. Lynch, the high-scoring, lanky forward is "sinking them in" with even more regularity than before. Cummings, long armed center shows much improvement since last year. 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Niagara Univ. Business School Here Starts Registering For Spring Term

Registration for the spring session of Niagara University, School of Business Rochester Division, located in Columbus Civic Center, scheduled to start Tuesday, February 6, 1934, will take place during the months of December and January. It is announced by Dean John R. Wilkinson. The Rochester Division of the School of Business is a branch of Niagara University, which was chartered by an act of the New York State Legislature in the year 1883. The Board of Regents of the University of the State of New York approved the erection of the Rochester Division this year.

It is announced this week that all candidates who expect to begin their studies in the Spring term should file an application blank in Room 504, 50 Chestnut Street, during the months of December or January. Each candidate should also submit either to his Grade Adviser or to a clerk in the Principal's office a school record blank. All application blanks and school record blanks must be filed before February 1.

The School of Business offers courses with degrees in preparation for Certified Public Accountants examinations, entrance to law school, executive positions in business, and high school teaching. Programs in the day and evening divisions of the school have been announced which combined with summer terms will enable students to shorten their time by completing the requirements for degree courses.

Changes in Regents rulings for the certified public accountant certificate are called to the attention of students finishing high school and contemplating the study of accountancy. Dean Wilkinson calls attention to the fact that the new regulations provide that on and after January 1, 1938, only graduates from a recognized college or university with a degree such as the Bachelor of Business Administration conferred by Niagara University, registered for the purpose, will be permitted to sit for the C.P.A. examinations. Prior to January 1, 1938, a non-college man must present evidence of three years of satisfactory accounting experience before he is permitted to sit for the examinations.
