Let us keep Christ in Christmas to bless all Christians! The National Council of Catholic Women proposed that we make concerted and universal the action taken by many and in many places — 1. To buy religious cards only.

2. To ask for religious cards everywhere. 3. To place conspicuously in our homes a picture of the Nativity or a crib during the Christmas season. 4. To endeavor in every community to have a crib placed in some store where it will attract attention and lead the thoughts of passers-by to the great mystery of God's love — the incarnation of the Son of God. 5. To organize children to sing the Christmas carols in the streets under the windows of homes. 6. To put on Christmas plays, tableaux or pageants with children as actors in every parish. Where this is the custom, to lend any aid in our power. 7. To have children or young people's groups give a Christmas play, tableaux, or pageant in institutions for children, old people or convalescents.

Never did the world need Christ more than today. His all-embracing love — His self-offering simplicity — His readiness for sacrifice and suffering — each in a small way may help to lead more hearts this Christmas time to the "Great Little One Whose All embracing birth Lifts earth to heaven Swoops heaven to earth."
