Catholic Federations Plan Bazaar For Convention Fund at St. Michael's Hall

Much enthusiasm is being shown by the members of the Catholic Men's Federation and of the Catholic Women's Federation in the preparations for the 79th Annual Convention of the Catholic Central Verein of America and of the Catholic Women's Union which will be held in Rochester in August, 1934.

This is the first time that these national organizations have selected Rochester for their convention city, and the members of the local branches hope to make this convention an outstanding one in the annals of the national organizations.

All local committees have been appointed and are hard at work devising ways and means of raising the funds necessary suitably to entertain these conventions. A card party which was most successful both from the social and the financial point of view has already been held by the local organizations.

The committees are now actively engaged in the plans for a three days bazaar which will be held in St. Michael's Hall, Clifford Avenue, near Clinton Avenue North. The bazaar will take place on the evenings of February 1, 2 and 3 and on the afternoon of February 3.

This bazaar is sponsored by societies from the nine German parishes in the City of Rochester that are affiliated with the two federations. Each of these nine societies will conduct its own booth at the bazaar, and each booth will differ from the others.

Permanent chairmen from these various parishes have been selected by the societies of the respective parish and will be in charge of the booth of their parish. Each chairman will appoint workers from the parish societies and these workers will assist at their particular booths.

It is expected that the bazaar will be not only a means of raising funds to defray the expenses of the National Convention, but also a means of making the public better acquainted with the work of the Catholic Central Verein of America, and a means of bringing the members of the various parishes into closer social contact.

The local organizations have chosen this manner of raising funds for the convention, so as to avoid as much as possible calling upon local merchants for assistance during these days of depression.

Frank Hehnlein is chairman of the general committee for the bazaar. William J. Fuhner is secretary and Laura K. Schilling is treasurer.

There will be a meeting of the general committee for the bazaar at the Hotel Seneca, mezzanine floor, on Friday evening, December 15, 1933, and also of the chairmen selected by the various parish societies. At this meeting the final plans for the bazaar will be perfected.
