**Fremmin Unit Gets Christmas Message From Fr. Hilbert**

"The Maryknoll Sisters have arrived and are living in a Convent across the way" Father Hilbert wrote, "and they have opened a Novitiate for Chinese Virgins."

Five photographs were enclosed in the letter, bearing the following inscriptions: "an out-station chapel for 30 Catholics"; "an out-station chapel for 100 Catholics"; "street scene in my own village"; "interior of my Center Mission Chapel repaired and enlarged with your help, God bless you"; and "your missionary after 8 years. Pray for him!"

The missionaries are suffering under the present unsettled conditions in China for Father Hilbert mentioned that a priest friend of his of the neighboring Prefecture, who had stayed with him during the recent Communist uprisings, was captured and killed recently.

Nazareth College Fremmin Mission Unit has been aiding Father Hilbert for a number of years as their "adopted" missionary.

**Missionary Here From Japan Tells of Catholic Press Aid**

That the Catholic Press is as important in apostolic work in Japan as in America was emphasized this week by the Rev. Angelo Margiaria, S. C., a Salesian Father in charge of the Catholic Mission of Myasaki, Japan, who stopped off in Rochester on his way back to Japan to visit with the Most Rev. Archbishop Edward Mooney, Bishop of Rochester, who as Apostolic Delegate to Japan had visited Father Margiaria's mission there.

The visiting missionary who has spent eight years in working among the Japanese people is a native of Italy. He has conquered the Japanese language and to keep up his practice in writing the language is keeping a diary of his trip to Italy and the United States.

Interviewed in the offices of the CATHOLIC COURIER, Father Margiaria told of the work of the Don Bosco press in Japan which turns out in the native language, Catholic books, magazines and pamphlets, which he said, are devoured eagerly by the Japanese people.

"The Japanese like Catholic literature and read very much," Father Margiaria said. "I believe the Catholic Press is a most effective means of reaching the Japanese people in our charge for progress in conversions is slow and with the aid of Catholic literature we are able to bring the light of the true Faith to the Japanese with more ease than by preaching alone."

The missionary from Japan brought to Archbishop Mooney the felicitations of the Most Rev. Archbishop Paul Maratta, Archbishop Mooney's successor as Apostolic Delegate to Japan and with whom Father Margiaria travelled on the ocean liner from Italy to the United States.

In the Myasaki mission, there are twelve Salesian Fathers of Belgian, French, Spanish and Italian birth. The mission has 12 churches, a preparatory seminary with 30 native students studying for the priesthood, a hospital with Japanese native Sisters and Salesian Sisters in charge and an orphanage. A parish has just been started in Tokyo this year, also a Sunday school attended by 300 children.

When the Salesian Fathers took over the mission there were only 300 Japanese Catholics and there are now 1,018. The principal religion in Japan is Shintoism and because of a different concept of God, whom the Japanese call Kami, it is difficult, Father Margiaria said to inculcate in the minds of the people there, a conception of the true God.

Study of the Japanese language took night and day labor for the Salesian Father, he said, because to have a practical knowledge of it requires the memorizing of some 4,000 characters. Father Margiaria has translated the Synoptic Gospels into Japanese and has translated many Catholic books.

In his possession, the visiting missionary carried a letter in Japanese from the Japanese Government to all embassies throughout the world. He left here Tuesday for the Pacific Coast and will sail January 11 for his mission. He left Japan for Italy on December 22, 1932.

Resumption of the Regimental Inspection and Military Ball of Rochester Regiment, Knights of St. John, will be marked on Thursday evening, April 19 in Columbus Civic Centre when the uniform commanders of the Regiment will again come together for general inspection.

Because of economic conditions the inspections have been held for several years in groups of two or three companies. Added interest is given to the coming inspection by the fact that the International Convention of the Knights of St. John is to be held in Syracuse in June 1934.

Lieutenant Colonel William H. Rossenbach is chairman of the committee in charge of the inspection and ball. Elaborate arrangements are being made for a military parade and review, dancing, lunch and refreshments.
