Joseph Schrembs, D.D., Bishop of Cleveland, Chairman Department of Lay Organizations of the National Catholic Welfare Conference: I hereby pledge a full practical fidelity to the standards of Christ and His Holy Church and to apply the same to all that I read, to stage plays and to moving pictures. As a vital part of my practical fidelity, I pledge myself to extend through personal example, through services in Catholic organizations, the principles of Christ and His Holy Church into every channel of social and public life.

3,425 Units in Society of Christian Mothers By M. MAMMANT (Paris Correspondent, N.C.W.C. News Service).

Paris.—Founded in 1866 by Father Theodore Ratisbonne, the Archconfraternity of Christian Mothers, has enjoyed remarkable development in recent years.

In the fourth of a general assembly of 108 confraternities of the Archdiocese of Paris, at which the Eminence Jean Cardinal Verdier, Archbishop of Paris, presided, Father Desvaux, director of the archconfraternity, announced that there are now 1,428 confraternities of which 3,425 are in France.

The canonical seat is established in the Chapel of Notre Dame deignan at Paris. The aim of the archconfraternity is to organize mothers with a view to the more serious Christian education of their children and to unite their prayers for the special intentions of their families.
