PHILOSOPHY GROUP PICKS FATHER WALSH

'Philosophy of Capitalism' Discussed by Msgr. John A. Ryan at Pittsburgh

PHILADELPHIA (NCWC)—The Rev. Dr. Francis Augustus Walsh, O.S.B., of the Catholic University of America, was elected President of the American Catholic Philosophical Association which opened its annual meeting here Thursday.

The Rev. Dr. John Rielly, of Marquette University, Milwaukee, was elected Vice-President of the Association, and the Rev. Dr. Charles A. Hart, of the Catholic University of America, was chosen Secretary-Treasurer.

The Rev. Dr. James A. McWilliams, S.J., of St. Louis University; the Rev. Dr. Edward F. Murphy, S.S.J., of New Orleans, and Dr. Francis E. McMahon, of the University of Notre Dame, were elected members of the Association's Executive Council.

The Rt. Rev. Msgr. John A. Ryan, Director of the Department of Social Action of the National Catholic Welfare Conference, told the assembly that the philosophy of capitalism comprises psychological, ethical, political, economic and religious elements and concepts.

Speaking of the three fundamental principles of Capitalism, Monsignor Ryan said: "Perhaps the most comprehensive and helpful idea of the philosophy of capitalism can be derived from its statement in terms of economic liberalism. Indeed, the latter phrase is almost an adequate synonym for the title of this paper. At any rate, it presents three aspects or principles which account for most of the important phenomena of capitalism."

Dies After Receiving Prayer Kit of Soldier Son Slain in France

DETROIT, Mich.—(NCWC)—Christmas Day was to arrive happily for Mrs. Michaelina Wojewoda, of this city, for shortly before she had received as a Christmas gift the prayer kit by her soldier-son who was slain in the World War.

On Tuesday, two days after receiving her gift, Mrs. Wojewoda died. She suffered a stroke—though last Sunday. She was 65 years old.

The kit, containing a prayer book, rosary, and crucifix belonged to Corporal Peter Paul Wojewoda. As the soldier lay dying in 1918 on the battlefield in France he gave the kit to a passing soldier with instructions to get it to his mother. It took 15 years for Thomas Caito, of St. Louis, the other soldier, to carry the dying man's wish, because Corporal had shortened his term of service.
