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Death Takes Three St. Joseph Sisters

SISTER MARY LOUISE
Funeral services were held at St. Frances De Sales Convent, Geneva, for Sister Mary Louise, member of the Sisters of St. Joseph for 48 years, who died unexpectedly Saturday afternoon December 30 at the home of her niece, Mrs. Louis Taylor, 16 North Street, Geneva. Burial took place at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery.

Sister Mary Louise had been visiting the St. Frances de Sales Convent in Geneva, and was returning to her niece's home when she was stricken with a heart attack.
Before her death Sister Mary Louise was teaching at St. Stanislaus School, here; for several years she was at Our Lady of Victory and other Rochester schools, and at Ithaca, Auburn, and Lima.
Sister Mary Louise was Miss Catherine O'Connor, before entering religious life. She is survived by a brother Michael of Detroit, and a sister Miss Mary O'Connor.

SISTER M. MICHAEL
Funeral rites were conducted in the Convent Chapel for Sister Michael Fitzgerald, who died Wednesday, December 27, at the Mother House of the Sisters of St. Joseph.

Solemn High Mass of Requiem was celebrated by the Rev. James Fitzgerald, Wyoming, Ill., nephew of the deceased; deacon, the Rev. George Vogt; sub-deacon, the Rev. Howard Geck. Final blessing was given by Father Fitzgerald; at Holy Sepulchre Cemetery the Rev. John Hogan conducted the last rites.
Sister Michael, a domestic, died in the 49th year of her religious life; she had been at St. Bernard's Seminary, Auburn and Canandaigua.

SISTER M. IMELDA
Sister Imelda Foley died at St. Joseph's Hospital, Elmira, Friday, December 29, in the 35th year of her religious life. Funeral services were conducted in the Convent Chapel, at the Mother House of the Sisters of St. Joseph. The Rev. John O'Connor, S. J., former pupil of Sister Imelda, was celebrant; the Rev. Frank Mason, deacon; the Rev. Emil J. Esner, sub-deacon. The Reverends Thomas Connors, William Ayers, and Louis Eidelman were in the sanctuary. Final blessing was given by Father O'Connor; services at Holy Sepulchre cemetery were conducted by the Rev. John Hogan.
Sister Imelda had taught in several Rochester schools; during the last few years, at Blessed Sacrament, Rochester and St. Frances Desales, Geneva.

Besides relatives in Ireland, Sister Imelda is survived by Mrs. Neil Foley, Rochester, an aunt; and Frank Albright, a cousin.

B., Prefect Apostolic of the Bahamas, recently appointed titular Bishop by His Holiness Pope Pius XI, was consecrated, December 21, by His Eminence Patrick Cardinal Hayes, in St. Patrick's Cathedral, New York. Bishop Kevenhoerster was for 21 years prior and rector of the Benedictine parish of St. Anselm in the Bronx. In December, 1929, he went to the islands as Vicar Forane and in May, 1931, when the territory was erected a Prefecture Apostolic, Monsignor Bernard was named Prefect and was so installed on Feb. 7, 1932. Reputed Canada Monk Unknown in Montreal

Washington.—(NCWC)—A man who recently made his appearance in this city and asserted himself to be "Father Fidella" of the Order of Friars Minor of Montreal is unknown to ecclesiastical authorities of Montreal and there is no establishment there of the Order to which he belongs. Inquiries made there have revealed.
To some residents near the Catholic University of America here upon whom the man called, he asserted that he was a United States Naval aviator during the World War, and prior to entering religious life. The man's conversations with several persons here have brought to light a number of palpable contradictions, while addresses he has given also have been shown to be fictitious. So far as is known here, the man has made no solicitation of funds.

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QUESTION BOX

"Is there a difference between going through a marriage ceremony before a minister and a justice of the peace?"
If either the man or woman is, or ever was, a Catholic, either ceremony can make them man and wife. It is a sin, a mockery of marriage to go through it. When it is done before a minister, the sin is greater, because it implies the recognition of a false religion and that is punished by excommunication.

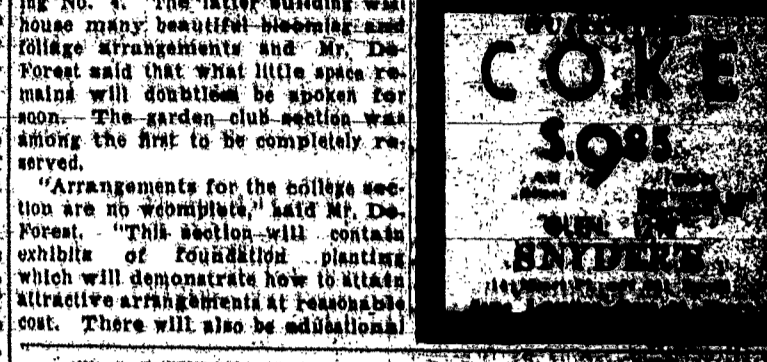
"What answer shall I make to those who cite the solemn conduct of some Catholics as an argument against our holy religion?"
Point out that this argument would have force only if those Catholics were bad because of their fidelity to their religion. The truth is that, if every Catholic lived up faithfully to his religion, he would be a saint. That he is inconsistent or sinful is due either to weakness of will to ignore sin or to his bad will. The Church is in no way responsible for that.

"What is required that one may receive Holy Communion daily?"
It is required that one be in the state of grace and receive with the proper intention, namely, not from mere habit, nor from vanity, nor from human motives, but to unite ourselves more intimately with Christ and to receive the grace and strength to remain pure and pleasing to Him. Every Catholic can easily fulfill these simple conditions.

"Should we place credence in the prophecies of St. Malachi?"
These so-called "prophecies" have been proved to be forgeries.
"How shall I answer those who assert that the Church accepts money when deciding in her marriage courts that a marriage is valid or invalid?"
This charge has been repeatedly shown to be false by the printed evidence of the trials. The fact is that, in many of these cases, in which marriages have been declared invalid, the persons concerned could not even pay the necessary expenses of the investigations.

NATIONAL FLOWER AND GARDEN SHOW TO INVITE UPPER GRADE CHILDREN

Alling S. De Forest, chairman of the installation committee for the 15th National Flower and Garden Show which will be held here next April 14 to 23, announced yesterday that he has completed the arrangement of the show. "Arrangements for the college section are no longer needed," said Mr. De Forest. "This section will contain exhibits of aquaculture, planting which will demonstrate how to attract attractive arrangements at reasonable cost. There will also be additional
